# SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

ANY PERSON who is the sole head of a family, or any male over eigh teen years old, may homstead a quarter section of available Domin on land in Manitoba, Saskatchewar or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency on certain conditions, by father. mother, son, daughter, brother or

ister of intending homesteader. Duties-Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may l ve within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least eighty acres, solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties -Must reside upon the homestead or (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra. A homesteader who has exhausted
