Rumor has it that George Stovall the former Cleveland manager, will pilot the Toledo American Association team next season.

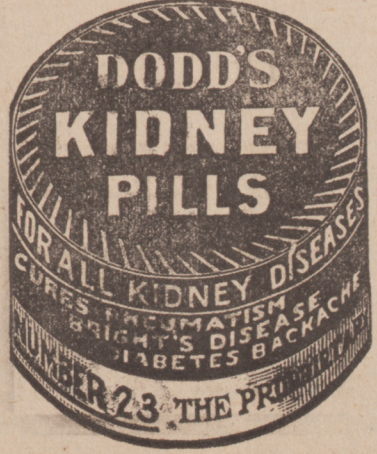

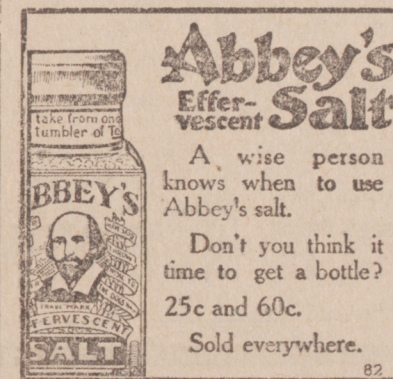
