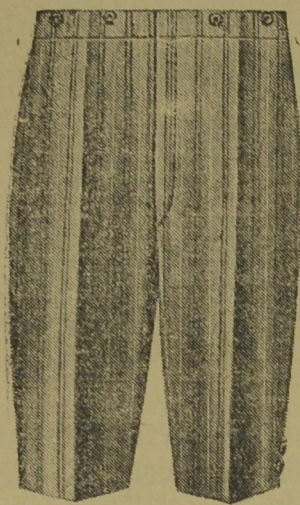

PREMIER BORDEN GETS
FREEDOM OF GLASGOW

Glasgow, Scotland, Aug. 16—The freedom of the City of Glasgow was today conferred on Hon. Robert L. Borden, the Canadian premier, by Lord Provost Stevenson. In accepting the key, Mr. Borden said: "As the British dominions grow in power, influence and population, greater than these islands, we must realize the need of further modification of our constitutional relations. "Certain responsibilities now assumed absolutely by the people of these islands and the imperial parliament must be shared by the great overseas Dominions. We of the overseas Dominions are convinced that the way across the seas must be kept secure. In no other way can the Great British empire keep together. The securities of the seas is essential to the safety of the Empire as in the breath of life to the individual."

INTERESTING AIR COMPETITIONS

Berlin, Aug. 16—Much interest is manifested in the series of aircraft competitions scheduled to begin tomorrow at Gotha, under the patronage of the Duke of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha. The competitions are in line with Germany's well-formed plans to outdistance all other European nations in the development of aircraft for military purposes. Prizes of considerable value are offered for the best results attained in aiming missiles from airships and aeroplanes and in taking photographs from flying machines.

RING OF WALES
MAY VISIT CANADA

London, Aug. 15—The story is revived here today that the Prince of Wales and his brother, Prince Albert, will visit the Duke and Duchess of Connaught in Canada next summer. They would be in charge of their tutor, Mr. Hansell, who recently accompanied the Prince of Wales on his sojourn in Paris, where he went to perfect his knowledge of the French language. The expected visit to Canada will last about a month. The Right Hon. R. L. Borden, calling at Newcastle-on-Tyne today, on his way to Glasgow, where he is to receive the freedom of the city, visited the Elswick Ordnance Shipbuilding Works, of which Sir P. Girouard, who is accompanying the premier, is a director.

VERMONT KEEPS BENNINGTON DAY

Montpelier, Vt., Aug. 16—In accordance with custom Vermont today observed the 135th anniversary of the battle of Bennington as a legal holiday. Flags were raised at many points, and as a rule the banks and all public offices remained closed.

The battle of Bennington, though comparatively small as regards the number of its participants, was one of the most important conflicts of the Revolution so far as results are concerned. The battle is generally recognized by historians as the turning point of the war. It was the first time in history that raw militia had contended successfully against entrenched regular troops. It made the victory of Saratoga possible, which in turn encouraged France to recognize the independence of the American colonies.

ALBERTA LEADS IN
AUTOMOBILES

Ottawa, Aug. 15—Statistics compiled from government reports show that in comparison to population, Alberta has more automobiles than any other province in the Dominion of Canada, there being 3,000 cars or one to every 124 persons, estimating the population at 374,663. Manitoba is second, having one car to every 152 persons of its population of 415,614, while British Columbia has third place, reporting one auto for every 165 persons of a population of 342,180. Saskatchewan is fourth. It has 2,537 cars, or one for each 194 persons of its population of 492,432. Ontario has the largest number of cars, reporting 7,338, or one for each 344 of a population of 2,523,208. Nova Scotia has the smallest number of automobiles, there being one to each 852 of its population of 451,889, and New Brunswick has 591 automobiles, while the province of Quebec, with 2,002,712 population, reports 801 cars.

Prince Edward Island is the only province in the Dominion which prohibits the use of motor vehicles on its highways and in public places. The penalty for violating this law, which was enacted because it was thought to be necessary to public interest and for the safety of the travelling public, is a fine of \$500 or six months in jail.

It is estimated that fully twenty-five per cent. of the automobiles exported by manufacturers in the United States is shipped to Canada. Thirty-two hundred and seven machines were bought in the States in 1911 and it is expected that more than 5,000 will come in this year. The average value of cars shipped into the Dominion by American manufacturers was \$1,887. English manufacturers shipped 240 cars, of an average value of \$1,300, to Canada last year. The foregoing figures do not include tires and accessories. Canadian manufacturers and American builders assembling cars in Canada also report increases in business, saying they have no difficulty in disposing of any vehicle that comes up to the mark.

FOUR CHILDREN
BURN TO DEATH

Elgin, Leeds County, Aug. 16—Four children of Thomas Harrison, a hired man on the farm of Thomas, three miles miles from this village, were burned to death today.

Harrison and his wife had gone to the barn to milk the cows, leaving the four children asleep in the house. They had been out only a short time when Mr. Dwyer who was in a field, noticed the house in flames. He gave the alarm and rushing to the burning building at considerable risk to himself got out the eldest boy, who was badly burned and lived only a few hours.

The children were aged one, three, five and six years respectively. Mr. and Mrs. Harrison keeps house for Mr. Dwyer who is a bachelor.

TO PROVIDE BETTER
FACILITIES AT PORTLAND

Washington, Aug. 16—The senate has passed a bill directing the secretary of the treasury to provide increased quarantine facilities at the port of Portland, Maine, to cost not more than \$13,880.

MT. ALLISON GETS LIBRARY

President Borden of Mt. Allison University has received a letter from Henry Ritchie of Halifax N.S., conveying the gratifying information that, acting in accordance with the expressed wishes of his father, the late Ex-Governor Ritchie, the extensive library of the late Mr. Ritchie has been donated to Mount Allison University. This splendid collection of books will make a valuable addition to the University library.

DRIED FRUITS CHEAPER.

Amid the general rise in the price of groceries it may afford some encouragement to know that dried fruits will likely be lower next winter than they are at present. The meaning of this is that the new crop which will come on the market about November 1st was a good one. Dealers who are taking orders therefore, are quoting lower figures for future delivery than for spot. The price of raisins at the present time rules from 9 to 9½ cents wholesale, and for future delivery quotations are from 8 cents to 8½ cents. Currants for spot are 8½ cents and future 8 cents; prunes, spot 8½ cents to 9½ cents, future 7½ to 8½ cents; evaporated peaches, which by the way, were very scarce last season, spot 14 to 14½ cents, future 10½ to 10½ cents. These future quotations are applicable to this year's crop in each case. All the spot prices are really lower now than they were two months ago.

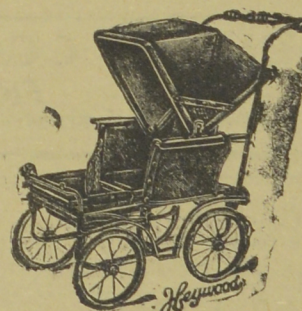
