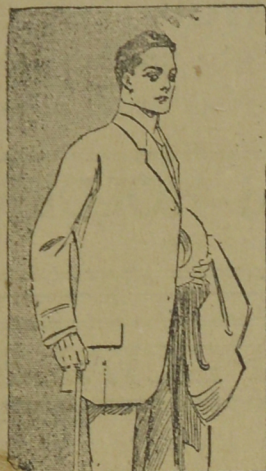

Lawrence, Lowell and Worcester are unchained so close in the New England League race that it is hard to distinguish whether one team or three teams top the percentage table. Pitcher "Slim" Sales is still the mainstay of the Cardinals' fling staff. Give "Slim" anything like an even break and its pretty much of a cinch that he comes home a winner. With their pitchers going good, a well balanced infield and the greatest outfield in baseball the Boston Red Sox have been a tough proposition for the American League teams to tackle.

MARATHONS WON

St. John, Aug. 17--The Marathons defeated Woodstock yesterday afternoon on the local grounds, by the score of 11 to 7. More than one thousand fans turned out to welcome the teams again and also to greet "Old Sol." Both teams showed marked signs of recent inactivity and the error column was entered by most of the players.

McGovern, who put up such a steady game at all times for the Greeks, was forced to leave the game in the first inning when he received a nasty cut under the eye while attempting to catch a low throw by Fraser from right field. The ball bounced suddenly and "Mac" who had thrown off his mask to play the runner from third, was struck a severe blow. White replaced McGovern and caught a steady game.

Hanley pitched for the visitors and had he received anything like fair support would have held the locals to a much smaller score, as he was hit safely only seven times. Black, Perley and Lamorey put up a good game for the visitors both at the bat and in the field, the last named having three hits.

Stone, who caught for Woodstock, threw accurately to the bases and caught three of the Greeks attempting to steal second. O'Connor was in the box for the Marathons and allowed eight scattered hits, most of the runs scored against his team being due to misplays and misjudgment. Riley, at centre for the home team, made three splendid running catches and, although he had one serious error which allowed two runs, the fact that his misplay was made while running for a long fly with the sun directly in his eyes and that he afterwards made two remarkable catches of what looked like sure hits, marks him as the most noteworthy performer of the game. O'Brien was a consistent performer at the bat, getting three hits and a pass out of five times up, but his fielding was not up to the mark.

Dutton was also weak in the field but his two-bag hit in the seventh, which drove in two runs and put the Marathons in the lead, more than evened up his misplays. The box score follows:
