CHEAP FARES TO TORONTO EXHIBITION

In connection with the Canadian Exhibition at Toronto which will be held this year from August 24th until September 9th, the Intercolonial Railway will give very low excursion rates which will give the opportunity to many to visit the "Queen City" on the occasion of its great annual fete.
