PROVINCIAL SECRETARY TO BE ORATOR AT PRESENTATION

Nelson Shields given by Lord Strathcona to Public Schools of Province to be Presented about Sept., 17th.

EXTENSIVE PROGRAM TO BE PREPARED

It is understood that the presentation of the Nelson Shields to the public schools of this province which is to be made through the generosity of Lord Strathcona, will be made here on or about September 17. Rev. Alfred Hall of Toronto, as was announced some time ago, is the distributor of the shields on behalf of the British and Foreign Sailors' Society. He has communicated with His Honor the Lieutenant Governor with regard to the matter and probably will be present himself.

A TORY POLITICIAN WHO OWES FOR MUD

O. S. Crockett, M. P. Made use of City Teams, But Declines to pay the Bill

Because Mr. O. S. Crockett exercises indecent haste in pressing for the payment of an alleged claim against parties who are his political opponents, it must not be taken for granted that he displays anything like the same activity in wiping out his own liabilities. Indeed an experience which the civic authorities have had with him would indicate that the very opposite is the case. During the summer of 1911 men and teams in the employ of the city hauled no less than forty-nine loads of earth to Mr. Crockett's lot on George Street, and for this service he has not up to the present hour reimbursed the city to the extent of a single cent. More than that he even repudiates the account and talks of engaging his law partner, Ald. Guthrie, to fight the city's just claim.

It will be remembered that a lot of work was done with the road plow in the lower end of the city last season, and a considerable quantity of earth was removed from the streets. Mr. Crockett wanted some earth to grade up his backyard, and was told he could have all he wanted and that the city teams would deliver it at fifty cents per load. The price was apparently satisfactory to him, and he told the man in charge to go right ahead and deliver as many loads as he could. The result was that forty-nine loads of earth were delivered on his premises, at a cost of \$24.50. A statement of the transaction was handed to the then City Treasurer, and Mr. Crockett was in due course billed for the account, but thus far he has not seen fit to pay it. It is mighty small business on his part, but quite characteristic of the man. Perhaps a dose of his own medicine in the form of an execution might bring him to time.

CHILDREN SAVED BY FORMER RESIDENT OF FREDERICTON

Mrs. Brownelle rescues her young son and playmate from Drowning in Cross River near Schroeder, Minn.

THREE WERE SWEEP OVER FOURTEEN FOOT FALL

A former Fredericton lady recently figured in a thrilling rescue Schroeder, Minn., saving her own little son and a playmate from drowning and coming near death herself. The lady in question was Mrs. Brownelle, formerly Miss Dora Parent of this city who has been in the west some years.

The rescue occurred in the Cross River near Schroeder. Mrs. Brownelle's four-year-old son Cecil and a little girl being carried away by the current.

Mrs. Brownelle leaped into the swift stream and seized the two children but was herself swept off her feet. The three were carried a considerable distance down the stream and over a fourteen-foot fall. All were rendered unconscious by the buffeting they received from the stream but the lady managed to retain her grasp of the children and the three were picked up on the shore below the fall without any serious hurt.

CAMPAIGN FOR PUBLICITY TO BEGIN DURING NEXT WEEK

Committee on Publicity to Meet Shortly--Secretary McDade Has Begun Preparation of Material --Important Points

SMALL CREDIT BALANCE ON OLD HOME CELEBRATION

The publicity campaign which was undertaken by the Board of Trade, with civic assistance, this year is to be pressed vigorously. The Old Home celebration, which was carried through so successfully, made it impossible to do anything toward making Fredericton's advantages more widely known and Mr. George M. McDade, permanent secretary of the board, was exclusively engaged in the preparation for Old Home Week. With the business connected with that celebration practically wound up, Secretary McDade will now be able to devote his time exclusively to civic publicity and advertising.

TO MEET NEXT WEEK.

The Publicity Committee is to meet next week for the purpose of taking action. Secretary McDade already has collected a considerable amount of material which is to be used in connection with the publicity campaign. He will begin at once on the preparation of a booklet which will be used for advertising purposes. Emphasis is to be laid upon the advantages Fredericton possesses in its geographical situation as a manufacturing and distributing centre. The city's position as the "railway centre of New Brunswick" is to be placed plainly before the public. The advertising matter to be used by the Board of Trade is to be well illustrated.

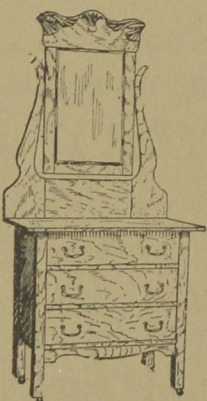

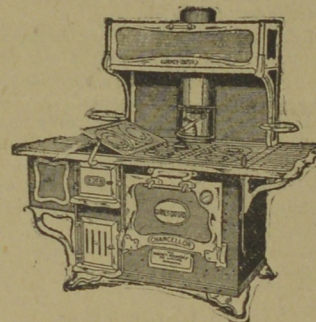

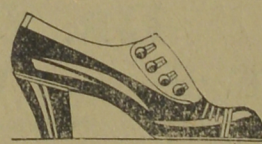
