



DOES INDIA HOARD HER YELLOW GOLD?

Many Millions of Precious Metal is Unaccounted For

water. The flow of gold to India has always continued. In the last twelve years she has received \$680,000,000 in gold, partly in sovereigns and partly in buillion, in addition to enormous quantities of silver. It all goes into the country, but very little ever comes out. Lord Rothschild observed some years ago that he had noticed that none of the smooth gold bars sent to India from England ever came back What happens to this great stream of precious metal, which continuously isappears like those rivers in deser: ands which lose themselves under

The testimony of experts is most conflicting. Some say it is boarded while a few are ready to prove by a formidable array of statistics that it cannot be extensively hoarded. Those who believe that India possesses v vast store of hoarded treasure make the wildest guesses at its probable total. 
