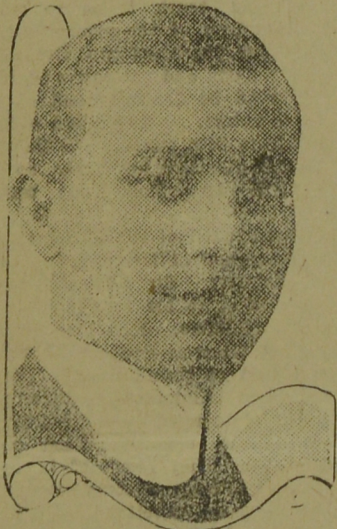

I.O.O.F.—Grand Lodge, I.O.O.F., for the maritime provinces meets in this city with Victoria Lodge on Wednesday, August 9.

PRIVATE PICNIC—Mrs. James S. Neill entertained a number of her friends at an outing at Nashwaakiss Friday afternoon. The "Ivanhoe" was chartered and was well filled.

AT LOCH LOMOND—Mrs. Alex. Gibson Sr.; Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Hatt Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Richards and Mrs. J. A. Edwards are at Loch Lomond.

SUBURBAN TRAIN—On Monday next the Canada Eastern Railway will make a new departure. One feature of the next timetable is a special train making the run between this city and Marysville seven times and return daily. Wm. Dennison will be conductor of the suburban.

YORK STREET SCHOOL—After the holidays the York Street School will be opened with B. C. Foster as principal of the High School and Messrs. Palmer and Inch associated teachers. The pupils of the Grammar School will take up their future work in the new building.

HAILSTORM—Yesterday afternoon a heavy storm of hail accompanied by lightning visited New Maryland. The pieces of ice were half an inch in diameter and lasted an hour after they fell.

LAST BLOCKS—The last block industry at Keswick under the management of Ora Gilpatrick of this city, is about closing for the season. This has been the best year in its history. The number of blocks shipped across the line this year is 1,200,000.

POURING IN—Money is pouring into the city coffers very rapidly this week. Treasurer Moore is taking in the shekels and those liable to be taxed are getting the burden laid aside. Col. Marsh has \$2,000 to his credit in Scott Act fines during the year and some very ancient offenses appear to realize their face value.

VISITORS—The steamer Florenceville arrived here Monday night with a very happy party of excursionists from St. John, who have been making a week's visit to the many very pretty spots on the river. Here the party landed and under the auspices of the F.O.M.W. Club were shown the city and Marysville.

FISHING—Messrs. A. H. Ward and William Magee reached here on Wednesday night from the Burnt Hill and Clearwater pools of the Miramichi, where they have spent about three weeks. Their kill of salmon, many of good size, was fifty-seven besides a goodly array of grilse.

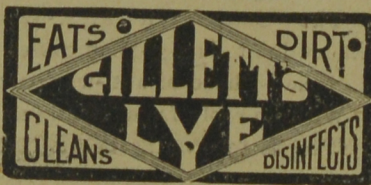
MADE FAST TIME—Alex. Gibson Jr., drove his big Allright horse from the new dam above Stanley to Marysville, a distance of thirty-five miles, in three hours and ten minutes. He

had a two hundred pound man with him and reaches about that himself. The horse was apparently fresh and looked fit to make the return journey.

GOLD CURE—Alex. W. Baird of St. John, representing the Gold Cure Treatment for Inebriates, has been in the city for a week hunting up cases on which to operate. The Board of Trade has called a meeting at which the offer will be discussed and some action taken. It is a good offer and if the people take hold of it as they should, it will boom the town.

(Note—Six years later Mr. Hartt and others associated with him were successful in establishing here the large shoe-factory which bears his name.)



WHAT IS A BURGLAR?

It Depends on What Time He Enters
a House, in English Law

A criminal can break into your home, steal the family plate, even become so desperate as to attack your wife and mother-in-law, and yet not be a burglar. It all depends upon the time when the outrage occurs.

According to the law of England, the crime of burglary can only be committed between the hours of 9 p.m. and 6 a.m. If William Sikes forces an entrance into your house in the daytime he is not technically a burglar, but a housebreaker. From Sike's point of view there is a great difference. Housebreaking is treated as a less serious crime than burglary, and a criminal captured whilst operating at a quarter to nine in the evening would, perhaps, receive a lighter sentence than if caught an hour later.

But, burglar or housebreaker, you have no right to attempt to stop his depredations by planting man-traps or spring-guns in your garden. If you instal these instruments of torture, and an unsuspecting "crook" walks into them and is consequently held fast, he will, if the implements of his craft are found on him, probably receive sentence for attempted felony, but you also render yourself liable to penal servitude.

Nor have you the right to shoot him in cold blood if you wake up suddenly and discover him crawling about the bedroom. Should he be armed and threaten you, you may blaze away, secure in the knowledge that you are merely defending your self. You may also shoot if he disobeys your command to stand still. If you offer to let him go "free" conditionally upon his renouncing the plunder, you will be compounding a felony, which is a very serious offence.
