IS VERY, VERY SORE
AT EUGENE CORRIEx-Lightweight Champion Can Hardly
Realize That He is no Longer
Title-Holder---His Alibi

New York, July 30--Willie Ritchie, the ex-world's lightweight champion, arrived here yesterday from England on the Hamburg-American liner, Vaterland. When asked about the treatment he received on the other side, and of his fight with Freddie Welsh, who wrestled the world's title from him, Willie said: "Among the sportsmen in England I was treated royally, but the decision rendered by Eugene Corri in my bout with Fred Welsh was most disappointing to me. I firmly believe that I was entitled to the decision but Corri appears to have contracted the habit of trying to please everybody. I was amazed when he failed to render a decision after the end of my mill with Welsh. Instead of doing so he waited till the ring was filled with Welsh's friends who were, of course English sympathies."

"Corri walked over to the Englishman's corner and waited a minute and a half before announcing his decision, as if he were really to make sure of the opinion of Welsh's friends. During all this time the Americans were waiting for Corri's verdict, following his moves with amazement."

"I was dumfounded when I heard the decision."

"Corri did the same thing in the Gumboat Smith-Carpenter fight. He waited before announcing his decision."

Speaking of weights, Ritchie said if Welsh had weighed an ounce more he would have been over. As for himself he never allowed himself to overeat. He just "starved" himself to weigh in, he said. He added that he will never box in England again.

IMPERIALS WON AGAIN AND

The Imperials beat the Federals 7 to 2 last evening and pulled up even with the Pets in the Celestial Baseball League, each team now having a standing of .750. Joe Wilson was on the mound for the Feds and pitched his usual steady game. Behind him, however, his team did some poor work. Three errors in a bunch in the first inning, with a three-bagger by Burden and a single by George Wandless netted five runs.

In the third there were two more errors by the Feds. Pat Clark put the ball over the left-field fence, taking two bases on the ground rule and Allan Johnson singled. Two more runs came in.

The Federals hit Clark pretty freely but he was well backed up and the Imps after getting their big lead, held it. In the first inning the Feds scored one, O'Donnell completing the circuit on his own hit, the put-out of Coward and Lifford's single. The Imps held things down until the fourth, when a brace of singles and an error gave another run.

ENGLISH YACHTS
HAVE DONE GOOD
WORK IN PASTSome Notable Victories Won From
American Boats--British Small
Yachts Very Successful

New York, July 31--While the English have to face the grim fact that during the last forty years their challenges for the America Cup have been defeated ten times, a close study of the records of the races sailed since 1870, in which American and British yachts have met on more or less equal terms, shows that our friends across the water have not done so badly after all.

The following table shows what the British have to put in the scale against our successors in holding the America Cup since 1851:

America--America has defeated Britain in every series of races for the America Cup.

The American yachts Dakota, Wee Win and other small raters defeated the British in the '90's.

The American schooner Westward defeated the British yachts at Cowes and elsewhere in 1870.

The great American schooner Sappho defeated Cambria very badly in 1870.

Britain--In British waters the British defeated the American yachts, Sylvie, 1853; Sappho, 1868; Navahoe 1893; Vigilant, 1894.

The British cutter Madge defeated the American sloops so badly in 1889 that the old American types were modified.

In 1888-9 the British-built cutter Miora sailed in American waters and out-classed all the 40-footers.

In the ocean race, Cork to Sandy Hook, Cambria defeated the American schooner Dauntless by a few hours.

After the America came the sloop Sylvie, in 1853, but she was defeated by the British cutter Julie. This was really a notable event, for Sylvie was a sloop of 205 tons and the Julie was rated at 111 tons.

In 1861 America was defeated by the Alarm, but it must not be forgotten that at that time the former was in poor racing trim. The defeat of the big Sappho in 1868 was a real triumph for Britain, although it is true that the American schooner turned the tables on one of her rivals, the Cambria, two years later.

Enchantress was badly beaten by the British schooner in 1874 and Navahoe did not show to any advantage during her first season in British waters, 1894.

Vigilant, the successful cup defender of 1893, failed to hold Britannia in 1894.

Turning to the small racers, Wee Win, Dakota, Wenonah and the famous "20," Niagara--all of which were designed by Herreshoff--literally swept the board on the other side, in spite of the fact that they went out against boats built "right up to the limit."

On the other hand, it must not be forgotten that in 1877 the little British cutter Madge defeated the "skimming-dish" sloops so decisively that for the America Cup contests in 1885, 1886 and 1887, our sloops had many points taken from the British cutter model.

While in the cup races referred to, in 1888 the Minerva, designed by the British yachts were badly beaten. Fife, sailed most successfully against the famous American 40-footers. No less than eighteen yachts were built before the huge Gossoon lowered the colors of the famous Fife cutter.

It is thus that the great battle has gone on for many years. Cup races were won in 1893, 1895 and 1899, but in foreign waters British yachts held their own against Vigilant and Navahoe, Ingomar and Westward upheld the honors of the Stars and Stripes.

Here is a detailed table of British and American successes:

American, 1851--America defeats the British yachts.

1870-1903--Britain defeated in American cup contests.

1891-7--British yachts defeated by American yachts, Wee Win, Wenonah, Dakota and Niagara.

1904--Ingomar sails well in British waters.

1910--Westward defeats British and German yachts in British waters.

Britain, 1852--Arrow and Mosquita defeat America.

1853--Sylvie defeated by the British yacht Julia.

1860--America defeated in British waters.

1860--Sappho defeated by British yachts.

Jake Boutles, one time Boston Brave, is playing a star game at third base and also with the war club, for the Bridgeport team of the Eastern association.

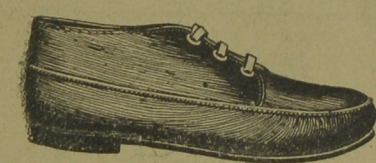
Clemson college boats of a pitcher who can twirl equally well with either hand. Wonderful "how well" this eccentric fellow can pitch with either hand.

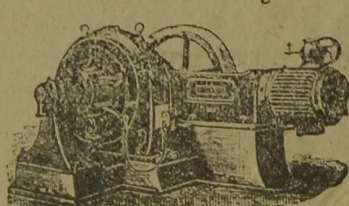
