CUSTOMS RETURNS SHOW A DECREASE IN IMPORTS AND DUTY

Value of the Dutiable Imports During July Was Greater Than That for July 1913

The customs returns for July as prepared by Collector L. C. Macnutt show a falling off in both imports and duty collected compared with the returns for July, 1913. The value of dutiable goods was somewhat larger.

SAYS ULSTERITES WILL FIGHT AT DROP OF HAT

Fredericton Men Witnessed Parade of Volunteers at Belfast and Met Sir Edward Carson and Other Leaders

Mr. Edward Moore, of this city and his solicitor Mr. R. W. McLellan, while on a recent trip to Belfast witnessed a parade of the Ulster Volunteers. Writing of this incident to a friend here Mr. McLellan says:

"We saw a parade of the Ulster Volunteers under Sir Edward Carson and heard him address the troops. We were then introduced to him and he was more than anxious to know how the Home Rule question was taking in Canada. He introduced us to his hostess, Lady Londonderry, and being Canadians, she, also, was interested in the same way. We also met a great many leaders in the agitation against Home Rule. You can form no idea of the intense earnestness of these people in their struggle against Home Rule and as far as Ulster is concerned I feel that it will never come. The whole country is an armed camp and they march and drill openly—about two hundred thousand of them. I had lunch at the club yesterday and met some big fellows including a member of the firm of Workman and Clarke. His firm builds ships and employs twelve thousand men. He marches and drills in the ranks of the volunteers as a private and his sergeant is one of his foremen. This is only one of many instances of fidelity to the cause. I saw their cavalry and their machine guns and we are the guests of the whole organization. They will fight at the drop of the hat and seem to be itching for it. The British army is in entire sympathy with these Irish volunteers. We make a mistake to think that it is all a bluff."
