THE HEROISM OF A FISHERMAN

A very fine act by the captain of a fishing steamer relieved the horror of one of the mine disasters caused by the German Navy's warfare against non-combatants and neutrals. The Steamer Runo, belonging to the Wilson Line, was on a voyage from Hull to Archangel, with some two hundred and eighty passengers, chiefly Russians, though some were Americans. One the day she left port she struck a mine and sank, with some loss of life. Three steam trawlers, the Silanion, Prince Victor and Straton, stramed up and rescued a large number of those who were struggling in the water.

As Snipper Wicks, of the Straton, was driving in among the wreckage, the look-out man forward sighted two mines ahead. "Look out, skipper, two mines ahead," he called. "Can't help it," shouted the Skipper back. "It's risking lives to save lives." And he hazarded his ship to get alongside an overturned boat or which a dozen men and women were clinging. Even as they reached it a woman with an infant in her arms released her hold and fell back into the water, but the chief engineer, James Rennard, fully clad, dived overboard, caught the woman, and swimming on his back, supported her and the child until the crew could pass a line and carry them to safety. The work of rescue went on at a feverish rate, for more than two hundred people were saved before Runo, which all along had been, as a seaman put it, standing on her head gave a lurch and disappeared.

MARKET FOR N. B. POTATOES

Word has been received from the west stating that the potato crop as a rule is light in all the provinces and that there will not be enough potatoes in the west to supply the demand. CHINESE GIRL HELD AS A SLAVE

San Francisco, Cal., Sept. 30.—The first conviction on record here for keeping a human being in slavery was obtained yesterday. In the United States district court Mrs. Wong Sami, an aged Chinese woman, was found guilty of holding in bondage Loy Gum, a slave girl.

Evidence was presented showing that the girl was smuggled into this country, and sold for \$3,900. She still was held under threats that if she attempted to escape, she would be buried alive.

DROP SCHEME OF SNAP ELECTION

Ottawa, Sept. 30.—It is reported in government circles here today that the proposal put forward some time ago by Hon. Robert Rogers for a snap election on the crest of the war wave this autumn, has met with a discouraging response from the Conservatives generally outside the capital, who with most Canadians put patriotism before politics. In consequence the talk of a general election this autumn is not at present being encouraged by the government.

The "feeler" put out last Monday in the Conservative press via the reproduction of an inspired Ottawa despatch to the Wall Street Journal, hinting at an early election and dramatically waving the flag and condemning the Liberals as disloyal has not evoked the response hoped for by the two or three politicians responsible for it.

Today the Ottawa Journal, which is in close touch with Premier Borden declares that there will be no election this year. The appeal of the country is not expected until some time next year after the regular session of Parliament.

GARAGE OWNER IS KILLED WHEN AUTO TIRE BURSTS

Montreal, Sept. 30.—Oscar Lussier, 1015 Marie Anne street, proprietor of a garage, died yesterday afternoon four hours after he had been struck on the head by the rim of one of the tires of an automobile. Lussier was in front of his garage at 1013 Marie Anne street, pumping air into an auto-tire. The rubber was deficient or Lussier pumped too much air into it and the tire exploded, breaking the rim and driving the pieces in all directions. A scrap of steel struck the man in the head crushing his skull in. Lussier was rushed to the Notre Dame hospital where he died at five o'clock.

The deceased was twenty-nine years of age and married. He had only opened his garage a few months ago, although he had been many years in the automobile business.

DIED TEN MINUTES

AFTER ACCIDENT.

Frederick Shaw, 970 St. Catherine street west, died ten minutes after he had been run over by an automobile at the corner of Osborne and Windsor streets yesterday afternoon. Shaw was crossing the street when two automobiles approached, one travelling south and the other north. Shaw stopped, not knowing which way to turn, and was knocked down and run over by the car driven by L. Garand. The victim of the accident was taken to the General hospital, suffering from internal injuries, and died at 5.15 o'clock. The late Mr. Shaw was fifty-four years of age and had several children, one of whom is Mrl. A. Stewart of 259 Hutchison street.

Samuel Rosenbloom, 1356 St. Dominique street, an Austrian Jew was struck by an automobile on Ontario street last night, and injured, probably fatal. Rosenbloom, who is in the employ of M. Lavand and Sons, 18Pine avenue, was unloading groceries from a wagon in front of a store at 1553 Ontario street east when a car, swerving from one side of the street to the other, struck him. Both of the young man's legs and several ribs were fractured, and internal injuries are feared. Louis Marcat, 1025 Ontario street east was arrested and taken to the Frontenac street station charged with being drunk while driving, and with having caused the accident.

ENGLAND AND GERMANY TO EXCHANGE PRISONERS

London, Sept. 30.—The British and German governments have begun exchanging lists of prisoners of war. This is being done through American Ambassador Page in London, and is preparatory to arranging an actual exchange of prisoners.

The first lists passed through the American embassy today. They were not very extended but additional lists are expected shortly.

Up to the present time these exchanges have been arranged only for women and children and men over fifty-five years or less than eighteen years old, or physically disabled. The War Office promises a speedy publication of the lists of English prisoners in Germany to relieve the anxiety of relatives.

If the government declines against a general election this year writs will be issued for by-elections in these two constituencies in October.

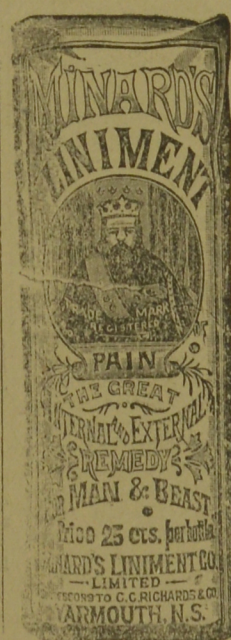
It is said that the decision as to a general election in Canada depends considerably upon the reorganization of the Ontario government. If the rival factions can be brought together and Hon. Messrs. Hanna, Hearst, Lucas and Sir Adam Beck can be brought to agree upon successors to Sir James Whitney, Hon. J. J. Foy and Hon. Dr. Rheaume, the political atmosphere of Ontario will be considerably cleared. The establishment of a strong Conservative government in Ontario again would go a long way toward getting the federal government to follow the advice of Hon. Robert Rogers and go to the country at once.

The Conservative central organization has all its campaign literature ready to flood the country and local political leaders throughout the country have been warned to expect an election at any time.

It is understood here that considerable pressure is being brought to bear on Hon. Frank Cochrane to re-enter the provincial government as premier but so far he has not agreed to abandon the federal field. Having just recovered his health, in a measure, Mr. Cochrane does not feel like exchanging his duties and imposing an extra strain upon himself.

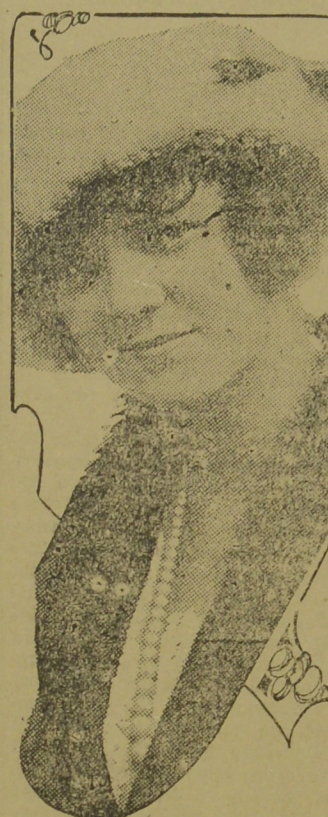
"MRS. PEYTON'S PEARLS."

Fruit Diet to Stop Strikes

Dr. J. Oldfield, the advocate of a fruitarian diet, lecturing in London, said that labor unrest was really a dietetic trouble. "Feed men," said the doctor, "on meat diet and they develop mental as well as physical uneasiness. The solution of the whole labor trouble is a dietetic one." Dr. Oldfield's argument was that every set of animals has its diet—there are herbivores, carnivores, and so on. Every sub-class has its individual diet—for instance, acorns are poisonous to cattle, and not to pigs; and again, each species has its particular fancy in food. The human race, by all the evidence, is closely allied to the anthropoid apes, and therefore a fruit-ivorous diet is indicated for us, for the apes are fruitarians.

Marriages of the Deaf

An examination has been made of the records of 4,500 marriages of the deaf, and it has been found that, while taking the marriages of deaf persons as a whole, nearly 9 per cent. of the offspring are deaf, and contrasted with less than one-tenth of 1 per cent. of deaf children as a result of the marriages of normal persons; a very favorable result is obtained if it be found that the deaf parents had no trace of previous deafness in their families. Marriages of deaf persons without deaf relatives is no more likely to result in deaf children than any marriage in the community at large, while marriages of hearing persons who have deaf relatives is just as likely to result in deaf children as the marriage of the deaf.

Fable of a Land-tiller

Once there lived a farmer who worked so hard he was too tired to go to church on Sunday. His hired men refused to stand for the first and last call to breakfast at 3.45 a.m. and left before the end of the week. His wife milked the cows and heeded the garden because help was so hard to keep. The farmer voted against hard roads, and when he was elected to the School Board hired for teacher a young girl just out of High School, because she would take the job for thirty dollars a month. In short, he squeezed the dollars so hard the eagle screamed. He would steal acorns from a blind pig.

When the farmer was fifty he had a half section of good black land in the corn belt and money in the bank. He moved to town to enjoy a hard-earned rest. But his stomach was so tired of corn bread and bacon that it went on strike, and the farmer ate milk toast. He could predict a storm before the first cloud appeared, by the creaking of his joints, and he had to call for help to turn over in bed. One day his doctor said he had made enough money to buy a new touring car, and the farmer died of heart disease.

Moral: It's a losing proposition to make a human barometer of yourself.
