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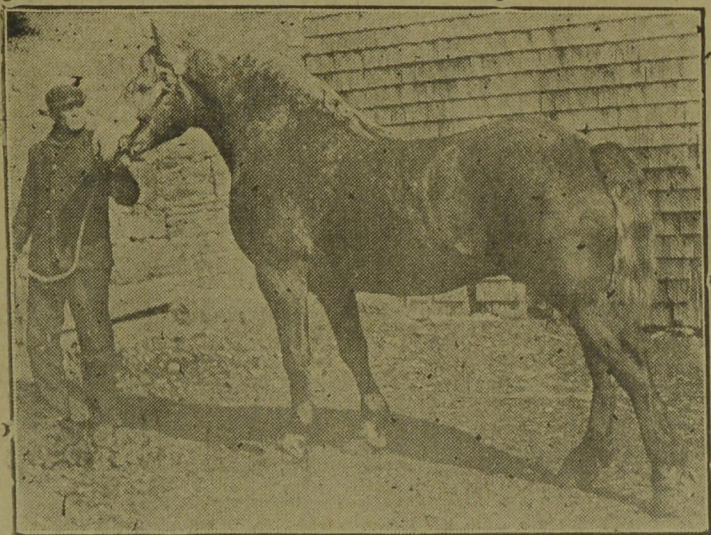

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SEVENTY THOUSAND DOLLARS FROM THE POLO MATCHES

Cup Games Were Paying Proposition
for Polo Association—English
Ponies Sold in States

New York, June 17—The international polo games were a source of great revenue to the association. It is learned on good authority that after all the debts have been paid, the treasury of the Polo Association will be close to \$70,000 better off. This will be spent for ponies and to help pay the expenses of an American team when it goes to England after the cup. The receipts from all sources—gate, moving picture and restaurant—were nearly \$100,000.

It is almost certain the Americans will challenge for the trophy. It is too early yet for any definite action, but just as soon as H. L. Herbert, chairman of the committee, can leave his room, where he is confined by an attack of ptomaine poisoning, there will be a conference and a challenge discussed.

It is probable that Harry Payne Whitney will captain the team which will go to England after the cup. His friends will ask him to and with out a dissenting voice the polists of the Meadowbrook Club declared today that if he had been in his old position at No. 3 the Englishmen would not have won the first game by such an overwhelming score and the big four would have had a much better chance to win.

The feeling among Long Island polists now is that the best chance America has of bringing back the cup is to send over the big four in their original positions—L. Waterbury No. 1, J. M. Waterbury No. 2, H. P. Whitney No. 3 and Devereux Milburn, back.

The English team will sail for home on the Olympic on Saturday. Most of the players must return on Saturday, because their leave of absence soon expires. Lord Wimborne is anxious to return to England to take part in the championship tournaments Hurlingham.

The players of both the English challenging and the American Cup defending teams were the guests of August Belmont tonight at a dinner at the Meadowbrook Club, besides many well known American polo players, some of whom were on former challenging and defending teams.

The English ponies will be shipped home Saturday on the Minnetonka, but several will probably be sold before then Frederick H. Prince, Jr., of Boston purchased Pepper Pot, a bay gelding, today, and Louis E. Stoddard, who was on the American international team last year, purchased Niblick.

"NEVER DO IT AGAIN" SAYS FRANK CHANCE

Detroit, June 17—Frank Chance is still on the suspended list. However, he wired Pres Johnson today that he was sorry for his Sunday conduct and deserved to be suspended as he lost his temper completely. He promised, too, that it would not happen again.

GILMORE SAYS HE CAN WRECK THE BIG LEAGUES

Raid on White Sox the Next Move—
Many Others Have Applied to
Federals

Chicago, June 17—The Federal league can wreck, from playing standpoint, the two big leagues within thirty days, if it cares to sign all the players who have asked to be taken over, according to a statement here today by James A. Gilmore, president of the Federals. Gilmore repeated his statement that forty players are ready to leave the National and American Leagues, but would not say how many of them would be absorbed at this time.

The Chicago American League team which so far has accepted the Federal raids almost intact, according to reports will lose other players besides Chase, who will play his last game in the White Sox uniform a week from tomorrow. Stone, Russell, Weaver, Benz and Blackburne are players the White Sox will lose, according to the report.

Assurance from players that by giving a club ten days' notice of a determination to leave it, a player could legally abrogate his contract has led more than forty members of the National and American League teams to apply for positions in the Federal League, according to President Gilmore of the Federals. Among them are Chase, whose desertion of the Chicago Americans for the Buffalo Federals has been practically assured.

SAM LICHTENHEIM SUES MONTREAL STANDARD

Montreal, June 18—Sam L. Lichtenheim, president of the Montreal baseball club, has begun an action against the Montreal Standard for \$25,000 damages. The action is based on an article in the Standard last Saturday reflecting on the plaintiff's management of the local ball team and practically advising people to stay away from the local ball games until there should be a change in the management.

JUNIOR ATHLETES TO COMPETE

New York, June 19—The junior track and field championship meet of the Metropolitan Association of the Amateur Athletic Union will be held at Travers Island tomorrow and give promise of unusual conditions and results for these important contests. In the past, the New York Athletic Club and the Irish-American Athletic Club have practically had matters their own way as the entries from the smaller clubs have not cut much figure, but this year all the less prominent organizations have taken united action looking to trying for honors in the junior contests and many of the clubs have entered their best men.

AMATEURS MUST SWEAR ON FLAG OF THEIR COUNTRY

Finland Refused the Right to Have
Separate Athletic Team at Olympic
Meet

Paris, June 17—Finland was wiped off the Olympic map yesterday when the International Olympic Congress adopted the German definition of an Olympic nation, under which Finland cannot enter as a separate nation.

The opinion was expressed by some of the delegates that Finland was likely to withdraw entirely from the games rather than compete under the Russian flag.

The delegates from the United States abstained from voting on the question. France strongly opposed the German definition. England and her dominions, with the exception of South Africa, voted with Germany.

The congress adopted also a proposal by Italy that a man who competes for one country in one series of Olympic games may never compete afterwards in the games for another country. It was decided that competitors must be natives or naturalized citizens of the country they represent.

The Russian delegates declared they had no objection to the competition of a separate Finnish team. They expressed a desire, however, that Finland's name should appear beneath that of Russia and not as a separate part of the programme as an independent nation.

A new feature was added to the Olympic games when the congress adopted a French proposal, that competitors should swear on oath of their country's flag that they are amateurs, and will violate none of the regulations. It was pointed out that a similar oath was required from competitors in the ancient Olympic games.

The congress accepted the definition of an amateur settled upon by the International Amateur Athletic Federation for each group of sports.

TWO NEW PITCHERS OBTAINED BY TORONTO

Toronto, June 17—President McCaffery, of the Leafs, announces that that he has secured two new pitchers. Palmero, the big Cuban that Manager McGraw, of the Giants, has carried for some time, is one of them, and Brooklyn has consented to turn over Pitcher Wagner to the Leafs for the rest of the season.

FAULKNER MAY BE PRESIDENT OF CLUBS

Cincinnati, June 17—That James W. Faulkner, for more than twenty years connected with the Cincinnati Enquirer as Columbus, O., correspondent and a political writer of National reputation, has been offered the presidency of the Chicago National League Baseball Club, was the rumor in local baseball circles tonight.
