HEAVY SINNED DELON

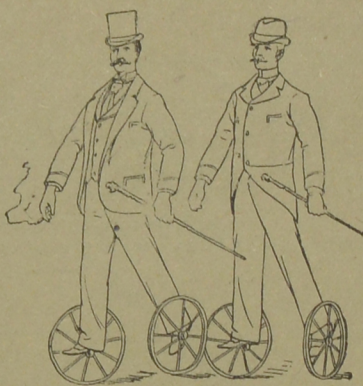

TWENTY CONVICTIONS UNDER CANADA TEMPERANCE ACT

Case of Lazare Richard of Moncton Before Appellate Division of Supreme Court—Other Common Motions Heard

Common motions were heard by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court this morning. One concerned Lazare Richard of Moncton, against whom are twenty convictions, under the Canada Temperance Act. James Sherren supported an order to quash convictions in twelve cases. Habeas corpus proceedings were taken in the other eight cases. In six cases convictions were made as follows:—April 26, 6 p.m., 7.30 p.m., 8.25 p.m. and 9.30 p.m.; April 27, 8.50 p.m. and April 28, 7.50 a.m.

Judge White, Judge Barry and Judge Crockett were present this morning. Court took recess at one p.m.

Motions were as follows: Ex parte Alfred B. Pugsley. W. H. Harrison moved a rule absolute for a certiorari and a rule nisi to quash an order of review made by Judge Jonah in the case of The Sussex Manufacturing Company vs Alfred B. Pugsley. Judge White took no part in the case. Court considers.

Ex parte Ault & Wiborg Company of Canada, Ltd. Mr. Harrison moved for a rule absolute for a certiorari and rule nisi to quash an order of review of Judge McLatchey, setting aside a verdict and entering a judgment for the defendant with costs in the case of the applicants and Charles S. Crockett. Court considers.

The King ex parte Patrick McClary P. A. Guthrie moved that the rule nisi be enlarged. J. J. F. Winslow

POCKET PEDDLING MADE TROUBLE AT THE CIRCUS

Chief of Police McCollom reports that the circus troupe gave no trouble whatever during their stay. No short changing or bunco games were attempted and the hootchie-kootchie dance was also conspicuous by its absence.

The police had some trouble at the circus grounds, however, on account of drunkenness. The drunks were local men, however, and they obtained their liquor through the medium of pocket peddlers, also local men. This is being investigated. Two circus-day drunks appeared before the police magistrate this morning and pleading guilty, were remanded till Monday. Another got out on deposit.

The circus-day drunks kept the police quite busy for a time. While one was being arrested another threw off his coat in order to beat the police, and a third appropriated the coat for his own use, giving his own coat to another. Men and coats were all landed in the police station and sorted out this morning.

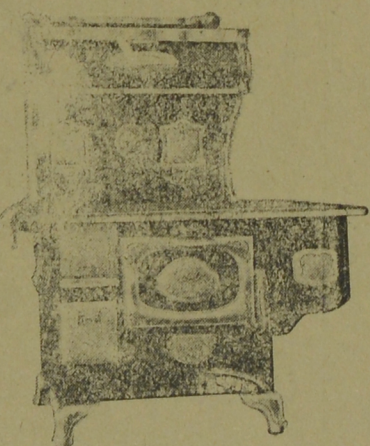
