Sir Wilfrid Laurier's Great Speech in Support of The Empire's Cause

"To show our fidelity to England, and our love to France."—Dr. Migault, surgeon-major.

"On this platform tonight there are many people you do not usually see on the same platform. We may have different political opinions, but in the face of the supreme question, we have put divergent views aside and declared that Canada shall take part in this terrible war in which Great Britain is engaged, and which has for its immediate object to drive the Germans from Belgium."—Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

These were the keynotes of the enormous meeting at Sohmer Park, last night, and they roused in the crowd—there must have been nearly twenty thousand people there—an immediate and spontaneous enthusiasm. There was a long list of able speakers but none of them could add anything to the significance of these two sentences. They embodied the spirit which dominated the enormous throng, a wholehearted devotion to the cause of the mother countries and a firm determination that nationality, creed and political affiliation had been brushed aside, for the moment obliterated and forgotten, in the face of a common peril, and a common duty.

SIR WILFRID'S ADDRESS.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier, who was greeted with applause which lasted for several minutes, said:

"I do not know whether this hall knows me, but I know it perfectly. I have already come here several times and under different circumstances. But I welcome the circumstances that brings me here tonight, and I am glad to see that the heart of Montreal is in the right place.

"This hall has witnessed many demonstrations, but never a demonstration called under such dramatic circumstances. You see on this platform men whom you are not accustomed to see together, men who hold different political views, men who have been separated by a gulf of conviction which many had believed to be impassable, who some time ago—I will not mention the occasion—bitterly debated participation or non-participation in the wars of Great Britain, but who, in face of the supreme question, have put aside diverging views, and have declared that Canada should take part in the terrible war in which Great Britain is engaged, the immediate aim of which is to drive the Germans out of France and Belgium.

"I said that its immediate aim was to drive the Germans out. I might have used a more energetic expression I might have said that its aim was to kick them out, for the supreme object of the war is not merely to vindicate the honor of France and the integrity of Belgium, but to defend the cause

of civilization against that of barbarism.

SCOURGE OF GOD.

"Let me say that this expression is not exaggerated, for the methods of Germany since the war began, recall that of Attila, known to history as the 'scourge of God.'

Canada has sent an expeditionary force of nearly thirty thousand men to take part in this war. Official announcement is made that another twenty thousand men are to be sent and you have regarded it as fitting that French-Canadians should organize a French-Canadian corps of men, faithful subjects of Great Britain, who have never forgotten the hand of their ancestors. My co-operation has been asked in an appeal to you and that co-operation I give with all my heart and soul.

"Let us be frank. What is asked of you is a sacrifice, a sacrifice particularly for the young people. But let me tell the young people here tonight that I envy them the youth which enables them to make such a sacrifice for Canada, for Great Britain, France and Belgium. It is a sacrifice, for some of those who go will make a pact with death. Many who go will never again see their native land. They will sleep in that of their forefathers. It is a sacrifice that is quite voluntary. Canada is an absolutely free country. What has been done up to the present, what will be done in the future, will be absolutely voluntary. Great Britain does not seek to impress her will upon us. She asks, but leaves us to our own initiative. We are a free people and none will go except those who want. There are those who seem to fear conscription. The voluntary enlistment of the present is the best answer to their fears. Conscription will never be accepted in a British country.

CAUSE OF HUMANITY.

"I am not going to discuss the question whether what we are doing is in conformity with constitutional practice. I am not going to discuss the question whether what we are doing is in conformity with our autonomy. When war was declared, I said that I, for my part, would do nothing to embarrass the government. I am a partisan, but I claim to be a patriot. The time will come later when these questions may be discussed. I want now to urge you to range yourselves under the British flag in the cause of Great Britain, of France, of Belgium, of humanity itself."

At this point the 6th Regiment entered the hall and Sir Wilfrid's speech was interrupted.

Resuming, Sir Wilfrid said: "I was saying that for my part I had religiously observed the rule I had laid down. I think it was a salutary rule and if it has not been observed,

the responsibility does not rest with me. The attitude I ask you to take is the attitude I have adopted myself."

Sir Wilfrid then referred to the trial of Bazaine following his surrender of Metz in the Franco-Prussian war of 1870. Bazaine, when asked why he had surrendered the strongest fortress in France replied that there was no authority in France and that a republic had been proclaimed. To this, said Sir Wilfrid, the president of the court replied: "But France still lives."

"Yes," Sir Wilfrid commented, his declaration being received with an outburst of cheering. "France still lives."

Had Bazaine held out the result of the war might have been different and the two provinces of Alsace and Lorraine not have gone to Germany.

HEROIC BELGIUM.

"But there is another country, a country whose name cannot be pronounced without creating an outburst of enthusiasm, the name of heroic Belgium. (Applause). Wherever the name of Belgium is pronounced there are cheers, just as I hear cheers now. When, scarcely a week ago, I attended a meeting of English-speaking Canadians at Ottawa, the name of Belgium provided the same cheers; at Toronto, scarcely a month ago, there was the same enthusiasm. For the people of Belgium have shown a heroism which has, perhaps, scarcely been equalled by any nation. For my own part, I cannot utter the word Belgium without feeling enthusiasm

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
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
