Eleven applications for assistance from families of soldier boys who have gone to the front with the first expeditionary contingent were under consideration at yesterday's meeting of the Relief Committee of the local branch of the Canadian Patriotic Fund. No action was taken and the cases were referred to the investigating committee. Two previous applications for relief were reconsidered and the committee decided to grant the families each fifteen dollars.


## OLD FAVORITES.

## BELGIAN GRAY BOOK

Paris, Oct. 22.—A despatch to the  
Havas Agency from Bordeaux says  
the Belgian government has publish-  
ed a Gray Book which contains dip-  
lomatic correspondence from July 4  
to August 29th.

In the book are reproduced many  
documents already made public, and  
also a copy of the note sent by Bel-  
gium to other diplomatic agents re-  
questing them to make known to the  
powers the intention of the Belgian  
government to maintain neutrality in  
case of a European war.

## BIG BATTLE CONTINUES

(Continued from page one)

war office tonight reports a continu-  
uation of the great battle between  
the sea and La Basse, in which the  
Belgians and the Allies are holding  
their ground. Between Arras and the  
Dise the Germans have met with sim-  
ilar opposition.

The text follows:  
"The activity which the enemy dis-  
played yesterday did not slacken to-  
day's battle. Between the sea and La  
Basse the battle has continued with  
great violence, without the Germans  
being able to force back the Belgian  
army or the French troops.

"Similarly, between Arras and the  
Dise, the enemy had made determined  
efforts, which have at no point been  
crowned with success.

"In the Argonne region we have  
made progress between St. Hubert  
and Le Four De Paris.

"To the north of Verdun we have  
gained ground at Haumont and Brab-  
ant on the Meuse in the Woivre re-  
gion we have repulsed an attack on  
Champlon."

Washington, Oct. 22.—A cablegram  
from the French foreign office made  
public tonight by the French Amba-  
sy here said:

"The Germans before Warsaw have  
abandoned their offensive position and  
are in retreat pursued by the Rus-  
sians, who have captured many pris-  
ers and munitions. The seventeenth  
and Twentieth Army Corps Corps  
have been decimated."

Russian.

Petrograd, Oct. 22.—The officia,  
communication issued by general  
headquarters tonight says:

"The rapid retreat of the Germans  
from Warsaw continues. The bombard-  
ment by the enemy's heavy artillery  
has caused no essential damage to the  
fortifications of Ivangorod or the  
bridges.

"In Galicia desperate engagements  
are still being fought. During the ad-  
vance in the region between Przemy-  
sl and the Xistula we captured more  
than thirty officers, 20,000 soldiers  
and many rapid fire guns. To the  
south of Przemysl the Russian operat-  
ors are developing a po with success."

German.

Berlin, October 22, via London.—  
An official announcement issued to-  
night from chief headquarters, says:

"On the Yser Canal heavy fighting  
is still in progress. The enemy was re-  
inforced by artillery fire from the sea  
at a point to the northwest of Nie-  
port, but in the engagement a British  
torpedoe boat was put out of action  
by our artillery.

"Fighting continues to the west of  
Lille, and here also our troops have  
assumed the offensive and have re-  
pulsed the enemy at several points."  
"The English have lost several ma-  
chine guns.

"No decision has yet been reached in  
the eastern theatre of the war."

Berlin, Oct. 22.—(By way of Am-  
war office made public the following  
sterdam and London.) The German  
despatch received from general head-  
quarters of the army dated this  
(Thursday) fore noon:

"The fighting on the Yser Canal  
still continues. Eleven British war  
vessels assist the enemy's artillery.

"East of Dixmude the enemy was re-  
successfully in the direction of Ypres.

"The battles to the northwest of  
Lille are very severe, but the enemy  
is slowly retreating along the whole  
line.

"Fierce attacks from the direction  
of Toulon Heights, south of Thiau-  
court, were repulsed with heavy loss-  
es to the French.

"The fact is the British admiral  
commanding the fleet off Estend want-  
ed to bombard the town, but finally  
was persuaded by the Belgian authori-  
ties to abstain.

"In the northeastern war theatre  
our troops are pursuing the retreat-  
ing enemy in the direction of Oso-  
wetz, Russian Poland. Several hun-  
dred prisoners and machine guns were  
taken.

"Near Warsaw and elsewhere in  
Russian Poland, after several days of  
battle, no fighting was reported yes-  
terday. The situation is still in a  
state of evolution."
