GOODS GO FORWARD TO THE SUFFERERS OF BELGIUM

Fredericton Lodge of the Knights of Pythias Makes the First Shipment
---More Public Meetings in The Country

The first shipment of goods for the Belgian sufferers to go forward from Fredericton was sent to St. John yesterday by the local lodge of the Knights of Pythias.

The contribution was made up of boots, shoes, underwear for women and children, hose for men, women and children, needles, thread, soap, brushes, combs, buttons and other necessities and will be forwarded to Belgium along with other shipments which will leave St. John in the near future. On each packing case was placed a large card bearing the following inscription:

"All brother knights kindly assist in expediting the delivery of these goods for the poor of Belgium."

A very successful meeting in the interests of the Belgian Relief Fund was held in McKinley's Hall last evening at Kingsclear. The speakers were Rev. Mr. Swewan, and Messrs. E. H. Allen and J. J. F. Winslow of this city. They made a strong appeal for aid for heroic Belgians, whose country has been devastated by German hosts. At the close of the meeting committees were appointed to take up the work. The ladies committee is composed of Mrs. Charles Key, Mrs. Z. R. Estey and Miss Hazel Dunphy. The gentlemen's committee consists of Mr. Z. R. Estey, Coun. T. C. Everett and Mr. Benjamin Goodine. These committees were empowered to appoint a general committee to collect supplies and forward the same to this city.

HEAD ON COLLISION AT THE JUNCTION LAST EVENING

C. P. R. Train Which Left the City At 5.50 P. M., Collided With a Special---Mrs. C. W. Burpee Was Slightly Injured

A serious accident was narrowly averted at Fredericton Junction early last evening when the outgoing train which leaves this city at 5.50 o'clock and a special C.P.R. train came together in a head on collision. Fortunately however no serious damage resulted and only the pilots of the two engines were broken.

There were between thirty five and forty passengers on the train from this city and when the collision occurred they were severely shaken up. The car windows were broken, the seats tossed about at random and to add to the confusion the lights were extinguished. None of the passengers were seriously injured although Mrs. Charles W. Burpee, wife of a former divisional superintendent of the road had her nose broken and several other women received slight bruises about the face and head.

The special train had taken the west siding of the Fredericton branch line to clear the main line when it collided with the train which was enroute from this city to connect with the train for the west. Conductor Palmer and Locomotive Engineer Ivor Saunders had charge of the special train while the members of the crew on the train from this city were Driver Aaron Simpson, Conductor Samuel Thompson and Brakeman Donald McLenihan.

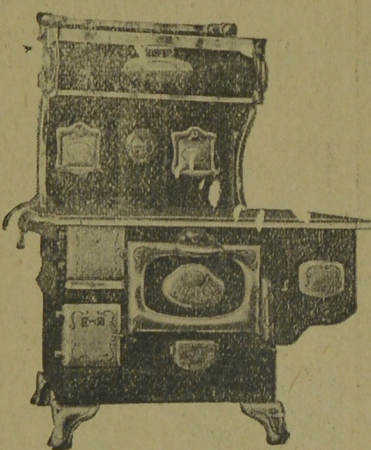

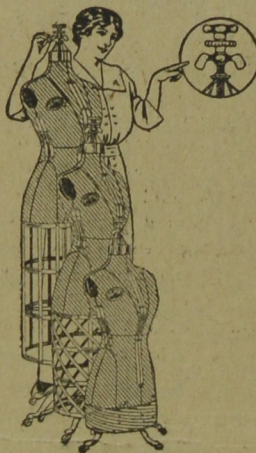

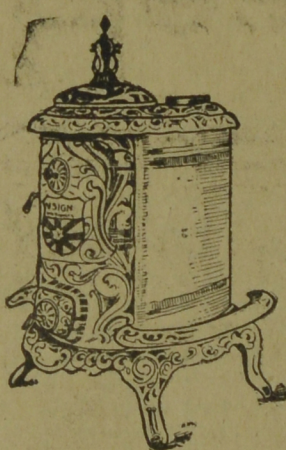
