FASIG STAKE WON BY GEERS WITH ANVIL HORSE

Helen Stiles unable to beat out veteran--Geers was cheered to echo at Cleveland meet-- Oakdale won 2.12 Trot and Babe 2.09 Pace in Good Time

Cleveland, July 31—When old Pop Geers piloted Anvil under the wire a winner in the first heat of the Fasig stake at North Randall this afternoon, the greatest shout went up from the grandstand that has been heard at any time during the present Grand Circuit meeting.

Although it was the third day of the meeting, it was the first time Geers had driven. The veteran of thousands of turf battles was cheered when driving Anvil, he passed the stand before the race was started.

When the word "go" was given and the southern driver, who had the pole, shot Anvil out in front, opening a gap of two lengths, there could be heard a murmuring of "Pop's out in front."

Helen Stiles the sensational trotter from California was a heavy favorite in this race, but as Geers with Anvil kept about the same distance in front of Jack London, the ringer that masqueraded last season under the name of Prof. Spinx and Helen Stiles and every one except the trotters were happy.

Around the three-quarters the trotters sped. Because the time to the half had only been 1.04 it was feared that Helen Stiles might outbrush Anvil coming through the stretch but Anvil never faltered. On he came around the turn and instead of his competitors gaining Anvil walked away from his field and triumphed over Helen Stiles by a big margin.

Then the shouts rang out from the 6000 or more spectators. "Geers wins Geers wins," was heard again and again and as the driver of Anvil alighted he was forced to answer the plaudits.

JONES GENTRY PROVIDES SURPRISE

In the 2.11 pace the New York horse Jones Gentry that came here unheralded created the surprise of the day. He was a rank outsider as the horse fans would say and he won in straight heats.

When the trotters again appeared Geers was again up and applauded. Having won so easily the first time around people hoped the Anvil horse would behave so that Geers could win. Anvil did behave well and try as hard as Helen Stiles might she was no match for the Geers trotter.

At the conclusion of the heat H. K. Deveraux called Geers into the judges' stand and telling how Geers had won his way into the hearts of the race-goers by his honest methods presented him with the Fasig Cup.

The 2.12 trot the third event on the program was the hardest fought contest of the day. Five heats were necessary before the gray horse Oakdale owned at Youngstown was declared the winner. Oakdale and Derby Boy were the contenders throughout the race and it was nip and tuck between them. Oakdale won the first two heats and was beaten the next two by Derby Boy.

Not until the wire was reached in the final round could any one venture a prediction as to the outcome of the event.

It was just a question of keeping his stride with Derby Boy. This the spectators well knew and it kept them keyed up. Many wanted to see the unlucky trotter win because of his great flight of speed. Others hoped that Oakdale would win and few left their seats until the race was over.

In the fourth and final event, the 2.09 pace, Babe was picked to win, but for a few minutes had the talent guessing when she got away bad in the first heat and George Penn came in first, with Mollie Darling second. But Babe, drawing third place in the opener, came back strong and took the next two heats and the race, although both Mollie Darling and George Penn gave her a fight.

Despite cloudy skies all the morning there was the best attendance of the week.

The first big sale of the week was made today when John E. Madden of Lexington and New York, paid \$7500 for Baldy McGregor, three-year-old trotter, owned by George B. Dougan of Richmond, Ind. The McGregor colt is entered in the Matron stake race at Pittsburgh and seems a likely chance.

THRILLS EXPECTED.

Tomorrow the racing is expected to provide the most thrills of the week. The \$5000 Ohio stake is the feature event and it will bring together a field of eleven star trotters. There also will be four other races, making five all told. The championship trot-

ting sweepstakes also will be a feature, but unfortunately only two horses, Billy Burk and Brace Girde will start.

BILLINGS BRINGS TWELVE TROTTERS FROM RUSSIA

Climatic illness overtook his String in Europe--Uhlman very sick for some time.

New York, July 31—A stable of 12 Billings arrived from Europe on the trotting horses belonging to C. K. Billings arrived from Europe on the liner President Grant this afternoon. Seven of them are American and five Russian, including the three Orloff trotters, the smallest trotting horses in the world, presented to the American horseman by his host in Russia, Count Telleigne. The odd horse Billings bought.

The horses were exhibited at the tracks in Moscow, where they won many prizes. The American trotters were sent abroad in April and would have been campaigned in Europe longer had not a climatic illness overtaken them. Uhlman was very sick at one time and The Harvester was lame at frequent intervals.

Among the Americans were: Charles Mitchell, 2.04½; Louis Forest, 2.20½; Lou Billings, 2.06½, and Slat, Lou Billings' pacemaker.

On July 13, 1897, Ed Deleahanty then with the Phillies in the twelve club National League made eight singles and a triple in nine times at bat.

Krause whom the Athletics sent to the American Association whence he was recalled by Cleveland was not a success as a come-back and has been returned to Toledo.

Joe Flanner, sort of assistant secretary to the National Commission, is hard at work codifying the laws of baseball basing his results on the new national agreement and the decisions of the Commission. Such a volume is badly needed and will be warmly welcomed when completed.
