Chatham Shut Out by Fredericton Team

BLACK FOX TEAM UP AGAINST FINANCIAL TROUBLE

New Glasgow Players Depend on Home Games for Salaries—Received Nothing for Two Weeks

Professional hockey when attempted by a small town has its drawbacks. Financial difficulties are the worst with which such a team has to contend. The following from the Eastern Chronicle of New Glasgow gives some idea of what the Black Fox of New Glasgow is up against:

"The Black Fox Hockey team have appointed Mr. N. W. Nason as their Manager. The team has received no salaries for the past two weeks, and no funds in sight for future salaries except the earnings of the team in the home games and what may be contributed by those of the public who are sufficiently interested in the sport to do so. Mr. Nason is giving his services gratis, and the team is out to win, as is shown by their foem throughout the series of League games so far played.

The Green Shirts seldom got within the danger zone near Fredericton net and when they did "Tart" Titus was ready and kicked them out. The combination of the Chatham forwards which worked all the time against Marysville on Tuesday night was not there at all last night the local forwards breaking it up at all times. Chatham now is tied with Campbellton and a play-off will be necessary.

SAMMY MURPHY STARRED

Sammy Murphy who was centre for Fredericton was the star of the evening. He scored two goals and was all over the ice. Frechette played as good a game as he has shown here this season. Jack Arnold was fast and aggressive at all times. Jimmy Murphy played a good steady game. The Fredericton defence was the best of the season. Mike Murphy was there with the rushes all the time and showed lots of inside stuff. Wally Watling who had been let out by Campbellton team played point for Fredericton and seldom has played any better. In the goal "Old Reliable" in the form of "Tart" Titus kicked them out every time. "Tart" showed about all he had.

CHATHAM OUTPLAYED

The Chatham team was outplayed at all times, in fact had Fredericton shown the form early in the season that was shown last night the local

SECOND PERIOD

Fredericton with a lead of one goal kept hammering away. Chatham made a spurt now and again but was not dangerous. Frechette scored the second goal on a pass from Sammy Murphy after another nice piece of play. The Purple and White pressed hard for the balance of the period but failed to score.

THIRD PERIOD

The lead of two goals which Fredericton had was too little to make the game sure, and the crowd remained on its toes. Chatham showed no signs of scoring however. Jack Arnold made Fredericton third on a pass right in front of the net from Frechette who took the rubber down through the Chatham team. Three minutes afterwards Sam Murphy made things solid by scoring after a rush by Mike. The game ended soon afterward.

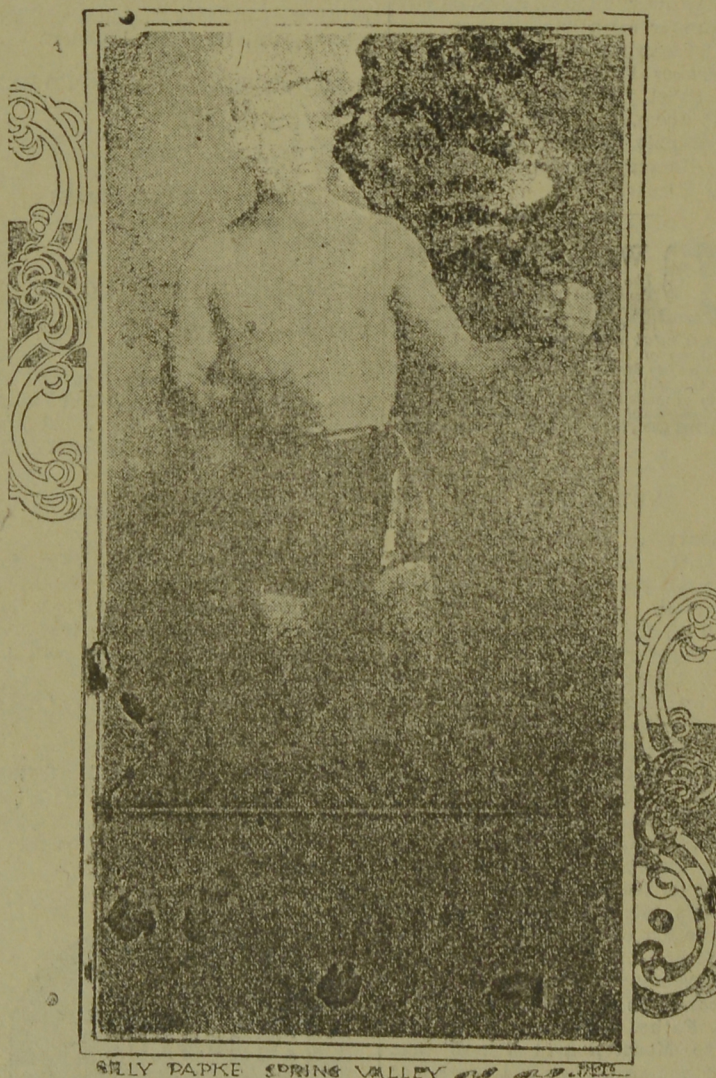
WANDERERS 11, ONTARIOS 3
