USED TODAY BY

GUTHRIE FACTION

Booth at Court House Altered After Objection Was Raised—Light Vote In Country—Quiet in the City

Election proceedings in the city today were quiet although there were evidences that the Tory machine was using boodle and rum in large quantities. This morning reports were that a very light vote was being brought out. As the day advanced however indications were that a heavier vote than had first been anticipated was being polled.

Money was used all day at the Court House poll by the Guthrie forces. Four dollars was the current price paid. The headquarters of the financial department shifted at various times but were located for some time in the Birchhill-Wilkinson block. The "bone and sinew" of the Guthrie party was eused in for about an hour ballot and cash being supplied simultaneously.

A feature of the campaign has been the activity of a former advocate of the "machine" who has been driving votes to the Gibson pool with his horse decorated with the sign "Vote for Scott and Help Smash the Machine."

GUTELIUS IS

EXPECTED HERE

TOMORROW

I. C. R. General Manager Will Discuss Matter of Location of Valley Railway Shops—Committee From City Council Will Meet Him

F. P. Gutelius, general manager of the Intercolonial Railway, is expected to arrive here tomorrow to confer with the City Council with regard to the location of the repair shops of the St. John & Quebec Railway here and the land required for them and other buildings connected with the divisional point on the new railway.

Ross Thompson, chief engineer of the St. John & Quebec Railway, stated today that he had received no word as to when Mr. Gutelius would reach the city but expected him tomorrow.

The representatives of the City Council will probably meet the I.R.C. general manager at the City Hall. The conference will concern the proposition to give a portion of Queen's Square to the U.N.B. in return for the college athletic field, which is to be taken by the railway.

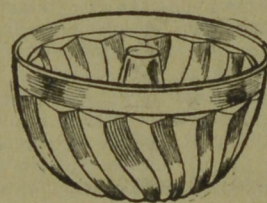

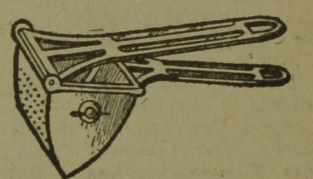
