

Until a year ago, at Thorbers Prison, good conduct scisoners were even allowed out once. a week on "parole," but, though no prisoners escaped, this custom has been suppressed.

Of all the Swiss prisons pe haps the folliest is that of Kreuzlingen, ir the Canton of Thurgay. The inmates have weekly smoking concerts, when the latest music hall songs can b heard, and good music, with the retui that at evenings the townspeople--Kreublingen has nearly 6,000 inhab tants-gather enviously under the prison walls and promenade in the street enjoying the free entertain ment, especially as some of the con victs have good voices. On these co casions there is no warden to preven a conversation between the prisoner and their visitors across the wall, and thus the former learn the latest news It is noticed that the prisoners are very polite when young women are present. ### FIGHT FOR THE WEAK AGAINST THE STRONG

Toronto, Oct. 12 .- Sir George E. 'oster, minister of trade and comnerce, addressed the Women's Canalian Club at the Y.W.C.A. Hall yes terday on "The Causes of the War." Ie said there were a great string of auses, ultimate, remote and present The Franco-German war resulted in a proud country being conquered by a proud and arrogant conqueror, and created a desire for revenge on the part of France. Germany emerged rom the conflict in 1870 a strong military power, with an amilkion for a stronger and prouder position in the world's history. With this militarism grew the

spirit of rivalry with Great Britain, and this increased that watchful spirit which sowed the seed of an ultimate world-wide conflict.

SLAV-TEUTONIC RIVALRY. Another cause, said the speaker, was the race rivalry between the Slav and the Teuton'. All this unrest, suspicion and rivalry was ready to break out at any moment, and time after time the peace of Europe was on the verge of disruption. "Of all things," continued Sir

George, "one thing is certain, that the British empire did not wish for a great European war. Within the last hundred years it has been the desire She entered into this war to defend the weak against the strong. She as poured out her blood for the inviolability of her honor and the indeendence of Belgium. BRITAIN NEVER STOOD HIGHER.
