FLOUR DROPS FORTY CENTS.


Local wholesalers announced this morning that Ontario millers have dropped the price of flour forty cents per barrel. It is expected that Manitoba flour will also decline in a few days. The price, it is said, would not have advanced if people had not got into a panic and so rushed the mills with orders that they simply advanced the prices beyond what the conditions really warranted. With flour, apples and potatoes at low prices, the people will not suffer so much during the winter as some had anticipated.

REPTILES BUSINESS GOOD.

Mr. Thomas Weaver, the veteran guide of Doaktown, is among the visitors to the city today. Mr. Weaver has had eight sportsmen from Williamsburg, Pa., in the woods this season and they secured five moose and six deer. He is here to meet a Mr. Beck from Williamsport, who will arrive tonight on his way to the woods. Mr. Weaver is one of the oldest guides in the business, being seventy-four years of age. The weight of years rests rather lightly upon him and he is able to set a pace in the woods which younger men find it difficult to keep up with.

BOSTON WORLD'S CHAMPIONS.

The Boston National League Club completed the most sensational record in modern professional baseball by defeating the Philadelphia Americans in the fourth and final game of the world's series at Boston yesterday afternoon, by a score of 3 to 1. Of the world's champions, twenty-six players are eligible to share in the prize money, giving each man \$2,813.19, should the money be divided evenly. On the Athletics twenty-four players are eligible to divide the losers' end, which would give each Mackman \$2,031.68 on a share and share alike basis. Each of the four umpires received \$1,000, the money coming from the National Commission's percentage of the profits. The attendance at yesterday's game was 34,364.

ANNUAL MEETING OF THE S.P.C.A. HELD YESTERDAY

Mr. L. C. Macnutt Re-elected President for the Ensuing Year---
Good Work Done by the Organization

The annual meeting of the Fredericton Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals took place last evening in the City Council Chamber and was very largely attended.

After business of a routine nature had been transacted the report of President L. C. Macnutt was submitted and adopted. Secretary-Treasurer H. E. Harrison read the report of City Marshal James Roberts in regard to the enforcement of the law against cruelty to dumb animals, which showed an active record for the past few months. The destruction of about a dozen decrepit horses had been necessary and several other cases of cruelty were looked after by City Marshal Roberts without resort to the courts and without cost to the society.

The report of Secretary-Treasurer Harrison showed that the society now has a membership of 127 and also a balance credit of \$141.55 in the bank.

BOARD OF TRADE HELD MEETING LAST EVENING

Addresses on the European War by Chancellor Jones and Prof. Stiles of the U. N. B.—Letter on Imperial Trade

At the regular meeting of the Board of Trade last evening an important communication was read from the Imperial Chambers of Commerce, the clearing house for all Boards of Trade in the British empire, dealing at length with the relation of the different parts of the empire with each other in the matter of trade, in view of the fact that Germany's trade with Great Britain has been cut off.

Chancellor C. C. Jones and Prof. J. A. Stiles of the University of New Brunswick, gave interesting lectures on The Events Leading Up to the Great War. Dr. Jones spoke on the immediate causes of the war, the diplomatic negotiations on the part of Austria and Serbia, the part taken by England to stave off conflict and the neglect of Germany to modify the demands of Austria. Prof. Stiles dealt principally on General Von Bernhardi's book, "Germany Next to War," and pointed out the absurdity of Germany's position by reducing Bernhardi's view of the state to the individual.

At the next meeting of the Board of Trade an effort will be made to bring about a discussion regarding the relation of the present war to the trade of the Dominion of Canada.

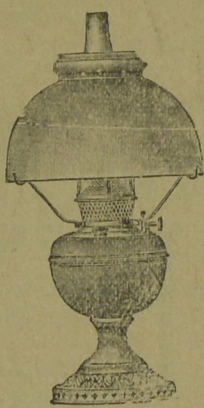
