LOCAL PLANT MAY HAVE BRANCH IN GERMANY

Chestnut Canoe Company Considering Proposition to Locate Assembling Factory in That Country—Would Lessen Freight Charges

The Chestnut Canoe Company is contemplating the establishment in Germany of an assembling factory, which would be a branch of their plant in this city. H. G. Chestnut, managing director of the company, stated to The Mail this morning that he had been authorized to take up the matter and already had had considerable correspondence with persons in Germany on the subject. So far, however, the proposition was in an indefinite state.

Mr. Chestnut said also that he had intended to visit Germany during the summer and investigate conditions personally, but a letter recently received from the company's German agent at Hamburg said that the agent would probably visit Fredericton and the matter could be discussed here.

The advantage of having an assembling factory in Germany would be the securing of better freight-rates and the avoidance of breakage of goods in transit. There is a large market in Germany for Chestnut canoes but the latter are frequently damaged in transit. Under the proposed system the lumber would be prepared here and would be shipped flat, being afterward assembled into canoes at the German factory. If it is decided to establish the latter workmen from the local canoe factory would be sent to Germany to instruct German workmen.

SEGEE CASE IS AGAIN BEING HEARD IN THE COURT

Famous Land Case From St. John Before the Supreme Court—John A. Segee and Turnbull Real Estate Co., Concerned

The Court of Appeal met this morning with Mr. Justice White, Mr. Justice Crockett and Mr. Justice Barry present.

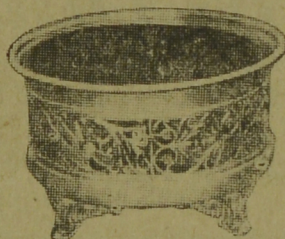
After hearing argument in the case of John A. Segee, defendant, appealing, and Mabel M. Ward, defendant, not appealing, and the Turnbull Real Estate Co., plaintiff, respondent, the court adjourned until eleven a.m. on Friday next.

H. J. Smith appeared for Segee in this case, and W. A. Ewing for the company.

The case is one which has received considerable prominence and has been before the court for several years. It concerns the ownership of a piece of land in the North End, St. John, claimed by the Turnbull Co. and John A. Segee.

The facts of the case are that on July 31, 1914, a decree was made by Chief Justice McLeod in equity, ordering and declaring that the respondent was the owner in fee simple of the lands concerned in the case, assessing the damages and ordering John A. Segee to pay the same, restraining the defendants from trespassing on said lands and ordering the defendants to deliver up possession and setting aside a deed from the defendant Segee to the defendant Ward and directing that the defendants pay costs.

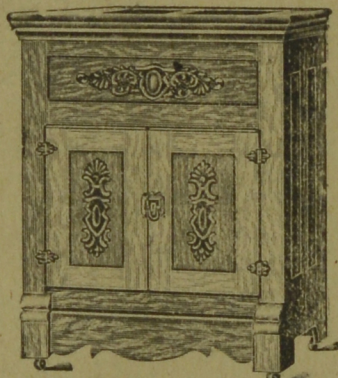
