## NORTHUMBERLAND MEMBERS CONDEMN THE GOVERNMENT

(Continued from page one.)

had not been engaged. He had information from one practical man who said that the work on one bridge in Northumberland which cost \$340 should have been done for \$80, while there were other bridges the work on which cost all the way from \$200 to \$400 where from \$30 to \$40 had been sufficient to paint them previously, although these latter figures may not have included the removal of the corroded previous coat. Continuing he said that the carrying on of work under such an arrangement as existed between the department and the company in question really placed a premium on laziness and neglect. Those engaged in the work had been busier over killing time and drawing their pay on work at Douglastown than anything else, according to reports which came from there and these complaints were supplemented by the official reports of officials of the department, samples of which he had just read.

It was only natural that public curiosity should be aroused as to why the department should permit work to go on in this way on the percentage basis plan for a company whose officials they did not know.

He would like also at this time to draw the attention of the house to the fact that notwithstanding the resolution which had been passed at the last session and which was moved and seconded by Hon. Mr. Fleming and Mr. Stewart (Northumberland) protesting against the closing of the so called Chelmsford branch of the Canada Eastern division of the Intercolonial Railway the rails had been torn up on a large section of this road, and it was being dismantled. This road in its building had been assisted not only from the dominion treasury but by the province, and the treatment which the people had received was not such as they might reasonably expect.

Mr. Swim said that he had been considerably disappointed as to the reply which had been given the house this afternoon on behalf of the public works department regarding the Barnaby River bridge. It was now more than a year since this bridge had been taken out and no effort had been made to provide another bridge for this deserving community notwithstanding the fact that the same people who had been accommodated by the bridge lost another public convenience for transportation purposes when the rails were taken up from what was known as the Chelmsford branch of the Canada Eastern division of the Intercolonial Railway. He had received many letters of complaint and he believed there was

reason for a feeling of righteous indignation in that community.

### SAME OLD STORY.

Mr. Flemming said he would like to refer a little more fully to the question of the hon. member from Northumberland about the Barnaby River bridge. The formal answer to the inquiry was quite correct but he would explain it a little further. Members would remember that legislation was passed three or four years ago authorizing a new bridge at St. John and also for doing considerable work to the suspension bridge at Grand Falls. This had been examined and while it could perhaps not be said that it was in a dangerous condition, it badly needed repairs, besides that there was the new bridge over the Miramichi at Newcastle. These were all big works of an expensive character and involved lots of money and while he was very anxious indeed in the public interest to see all the bridges that wanted repair in the provinces duly attended to he wanted his progressiveness to be tempered with reasonable conservatism. To undertake all the repairs that are reasonably required now would necessitate an expenditure of about eight hundred thousand dollars in addition to the half million to which the province is already committed to the bridges mentioned. Under such circumstances the government felt that much as some of the bridges needed attention they would have to be deferred.

Mr. Speaker resumed the chair. The chairman reported that the committee had passed the supply resolutions, which were forthwith adopted.

Hon. Mr. Flemming moved that the time for introduction of private bills be extended till Monday next.

Mr. Dugal gave notice of inquiry as to the Concrete Construction Company as to the amount of succession duty collected by the late attorney-general, as to the Southamptown Ry. and the New Brunswick & Seaboard Railway as to the number officials at present engaged in the department of agriculture and as to the incorporators of the Fredericton and Grand Lake Coal and Railway Company.

Mr. Young presented the petition of the municipality of York in favor of a bill to amend an act relating to administration of justice in the county of York; also another petition in favor of a bill to amend section 23 of the New Brunswick election act so far as it relates to York County; also another petition in favor of a bill to amend section 34 of the city of Fredericton assessment act. The house adjourned at 6.05 p. m.

## CASE OF DR. GERRARD AGAIN TO THE FRONT

Dr. F. A. Godsoe, Registrar of New Brunswick Dental Association here  
In That Connection

Dr. F. A. Godsoe of St. John, registrar of the New Brunswick Dental Association, is in the city today in connection with action which that association has taken against Dr. W. Gerrard of Fredericton, who is charged with practising dentistry contrary to provincial statute. Dr. Gerrard resides in New Maryland but has an office on King street in this city. Some time ago he was charged on the complaint of the association with being an illegal practitioner and a fine was imposed upon him. It is understood that the association claims Dr. Gerrard promised at that time to stop practising dentistry as he was not a member of the New Brunswick Dental Association, but that he has continued to practise, contrary to that promise.

Dr. Godsoe, with R. B. Hanson as counsel, appeared before the police magistrate this morning in connection with the matter. P. A. Guthrie appeared for Dr. Gerrard and claimed that the fine imposed upon his client had been paid. The police magistrate said it had been allowed to stand and never had been paid. The association will press for the payment of the fine and also will try to stop Dr. Gerrard from practising.

### TO ACT AS COUNSEL

It is understood that Slipp & Hanson will act as counsel for the city in connection with the bills which are being put forward by the Municipality of York and which the city will oppose. One bill concerns the reapportionment between city and county of the cost of administration of justice making the city's share heavier and the other is to prevent the city from assessing residents of the county who are employed in the city.
