## Canada's Next Governor General Who is Going to the Front

## FRENCH NOT BADLY BEATEN IN LORRAINE

London, Aug. 24.—An official despatch from Paris says: An official German telegram has announced that we suffered a severe reverse in Lorraine on August twentieth, which was transformed on August the twenty-first to a rout, in the course of which we were said to have lost ten thousand men, who were taken prisoners and fifty guns.

These are ridiculous exaggerations. The German success in Lorraine does not exceed that gained by us in Alsace. The number of guns left by us in the hands of the Germans is certainly inferior to that which we captured in Alsace, and the total of our dead, wounded, prisoners and missing will certainly be far less than ten thousand, the figure given as the number of prisoners alone.

Luring our retreat none of our troops crossed the Meurthe River, all remaining in front of Nancy. This momentary withdrawal following the vigorous advance is the only episode in a conflict which will necessarily involve numerous alterations of flux and reflux.

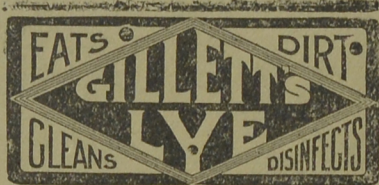
Our troops in Lorraine remain full of ardor, and are inspired with the determination to conquer and to avenge their dead.

## BRITAIN AND FRANCE CONTROL HIGH SEAS

Washington, Aug. 23.—That great Britain and France now control the seas in all parts of the world and that seven per cent of the German shipping is now in British hands, are statements contained in an official announcement given out at the British Embassy tonight, being a resume of the naval situation prepared by the Government in London. The statement follows:

"The floating trade of Germany has been brought to a standstill by the operations of the British cruisers in the different parts of the world. The German fleet is unable to interfere or to set their commerce free, owing to the British main fleet, which is cruising in full strength and preventing any interference with the cruisers.

"Already about seven per cent of the total German tonnage is in British hands, another twenty per cent is sheltering in neutral harbors, and the remainder is either in German harbors, unable to move, or endeavoring to find security. British shipping, with the exception of less than one per cent, which was in German harbors at the outbreak of war, is actively pursuing its business on all the great commercial routes.

"The German squadron in China has been rendered ineffective by the constant pursuit by the British squadron in the Far East. Trade in China is therefore unaffected.

"The Austrian squadron in the Adriatic has retired into the Adriatic before the Anglo-French fleet, which is so superior that it is able to send strong detachments to any parts of the Mediterranean or adjoining seas in which naval forces may be required.

"Great numbers of the safeguarding population of Great Britain are offering themselves for service in the fleet."

## ISLAND SENATOR FORFEITS HIS SEAT

Ottawa, Aug. 24.—Because he has missed two consecutive sessions of parliament, the Hon. Senator James E. Robertson of Prince Edward Island, forfeits his seat. He is a Liberal and was appointed to the senate in 1902.

The Hon. William McDonald, Conservative, of Cape Breton, saved his seat by attending the emergency session. The Hon. W. J. MacDonald, Conservative, of British Columbia, has already forfeited his seat.

Several senators, notably Messrs. De Boucherville, Sheehy, Thompson and Denville, were not present this session but will save their seats if they come next year. When all existing vacancies are filled there will be a Liberal majority of fourteen.

## CANADA'S NEW PARK

Old Trading Post Stood in Midst of Beautiful Forest Tract

Forty-seven years ago two adventurous young Englishmen, Viscount Milton and Dr. Cheadle, after passing the winter in a Saskatchewan forest set out from Edmonton to cross the Rocky Mountains and to reach the Pacific coast by the overland route. After a most laborious journey, attended with much hardship and of much danger, they accomplished their purpose. They crossed the Rockies by way of the Yellowhead Pass, while accurate surveys have since determined to be the easiest passage through the mountains, and is the route followed by the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway on its passage over the great divide. On their journey they arrived at Jasper House, an ancient landmark, even at that time, the geography of this part of Canada. One hundred years ago Jasper House was one of the most important trading posts of the Hudson Bay Company in all the far North-west. It was built in the year 1809 by Jasper Hawes, who is frequently referred to by the early explorers of the upper Rockies.

The site of the old trading post is now the centre of Jasper Park. This playground of scenic beauty and largely unexplored area has been set aside by the Federal Government of Canada and will be preserved in its state of nature so far as such condition is consistent with the purpose for which the reserve is created. It will be open to the holiday-maker and the tourist; to the explorer, for much of it in detail is still an unknown land to the student of nature, to the artist and to those wishing to study at first hand the problems of forestry in a country where forests will be preserved in their natural state.

## LOCOMOTIVES TOW SHIPS

Forty "Electric Mules" Will Operate at Panama Canal

The forty towing locomotives for hauling vessels through the locks of the Panama Canal weigh 82,500 pounds; measure 32 feet 9½ inches long by 8 feet wide by 9 feet 3 inches the greatest height over the cabs have an available tractive effort as high as 47,500 pounds, and a winding rope pull of 25,000 pounds, and four of them, two on each side, will or directly propel steamships through the locks. Sometimes six engines will be needed to handle extra large vessels; in every case two astern, acting as a brake on the ship's movements will give direction to her course. No vessel will be allowed to enter the locks and go through on her own power. The locomotive is propelled by means of a rack rail while towing and while going up or down the steep grades from one level to another at a speed of two miles per hour. While running idle or on return tracks the speed is changed to five miles per hour, and the machine is propelled by the regular traction method, the track pinion being entirely released. This change is effected by manually-operated clutches located in the gear mechanism in connection with a lever in each cab similar to a steam locomotive. The locomotive is driven by two 75 horse-power totally inclosed motors of the mill type, one being direct connected through reduction to each axle.

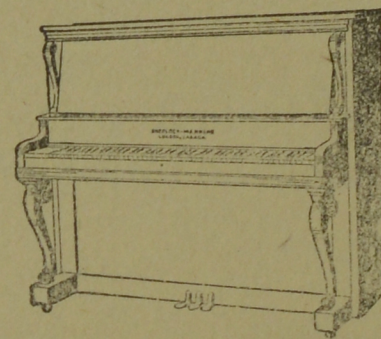

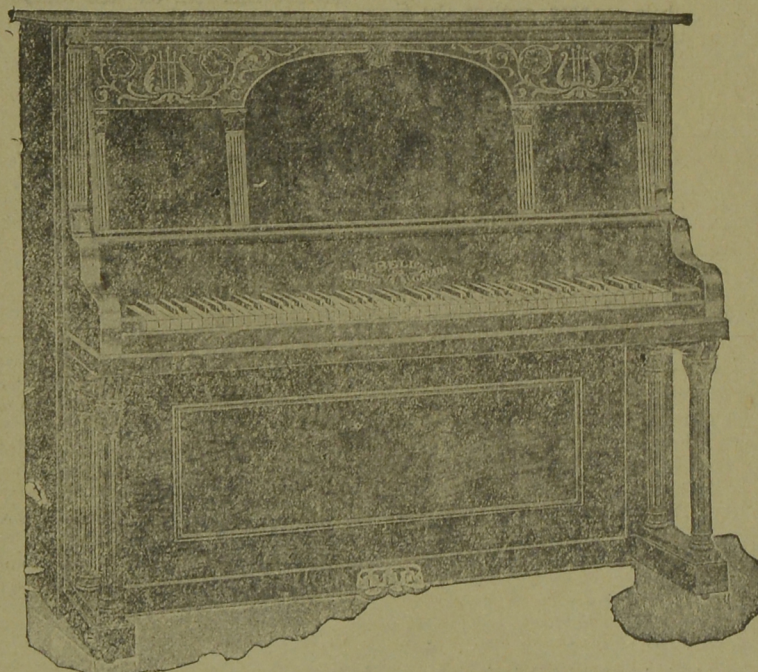
