MORE VOLUNTEERS

TO LEAVE FOR VAL-

CARTIER P. Q.

Recruits at the Barracks Under Orders to Leave the City Tomorrow Evening--Capt. Woodbridge to Command Contingent

Orders for the departure of the second contingent of volunteers for active service from the 71st Regt. were received from Ottawa this morning by Major W. H. Gray, the officer commanding in the absence of Lt. Col. H. F. McLeod.

About twenty-five volunteers will leave for Val Cartier, Quebec, on the 6.30 I.C.R. train tomorrow evening and it is understood that Capt. H. F. G. Woodbridge, who has been the recruiting officer in charge of the military station, will be in command of the contingent.

Preparations are being made for the troops' departure and this morning haversacks, water bottles, great coats and other necessary equipment was issued to the men. Last evening a guard was mounted under the command of Sergt. John Lavigne, formerly of the Royal Artillery, and today none of the recruits are allowed out of barracks without the permission of the officer commanding.

TO RECRUIT 71ST.

A telegram was received from Ottawa yesterday afternoon ordering that the 71st Regt. be immediately recruited to its full strength of 530 men and officers. A meeting of the local officers was immediately held in the orderly room at the Armory to discuss the situation and make arrangements for the recruiting to commence at once. Major W. H. Gray presided at the meeting and the other officers in attendance.

Mrs. Simpson is the principal of the Morrison Mill School and Miss Verna Baird, daughter of Mr. H. P. Baird, has been appointed to the position made vacant by Miss Sherman, who was recently granted a two months' leave of absence.

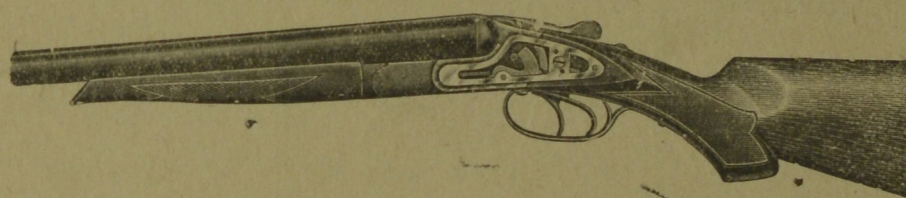
