MORE QUESTIONS FOR FLEM- MING GOVERNMENT TO ANSWER

The following notices of enquiry were given in the Legislature on Tuesday by opposition members.

NOTICE OF INQUIRY FOR FRIDAY NEXT.

1.—Has the government the names of the persons, firms and companies employed sub-contractors by the St. John & Quebec Railway Co. Ltd. upon the Valley Railway?
2.—If so, who are they and upon what section of the road are they engaged?

NOTICE OF INQUIRY FOR FRIDAY NEXT.

(1)—What was the amount of interest paid by the province during the fiscal years of 1907 and what was it for the fiscal year of 1913?
(2)—What was the gross and net debt of the province, October 31, 1907 and October 31, 1913.
(3)—What were the indirect liabilities of the province, October 31st 1907 and what were they October 31, 1913?

NOTICE OF INQUIRY FOR FRIDAY NEXT.

(1)—Has the attention of the board of Education or the Educational authorities been called to the fact that there has been no school available for the colored children of Otisabog for two or three years?
(2)—Have any efforts been made to secure a teacher for them? If so, what is the reason they were not successful?

NOTICE OF INQUIRY FOR FRIDAY NEXT.

(1)—Did Mack Dufour an official of the Crown Land Department in the County of Madawaska wait upon the Minister of Lands and Mines recently in connection with the settlement of lands along the Trout River?

(2)—What report did he make?
(3)—Did Deputy Land surveyor, Emmerson allot certain lands along Trout River to new settlers.
(4)—How many settlers located there, built houses and cleared land?
(5)—How many of them paid the usual settlement fee of five dollars?
(6)—What reasons had the Minister for having the settlers notified that they must surrender their lots after spending so much time and labor upon them?

(1)—What amounts did each Municipality in the province pay towards the up-keep of the Provincial Hospital for Nervous Diseases for the fiscal year 1912?

(2)—What has been total cost to province for expenditures upon the railway and interest upon bonds issued in connection therewith since October 30, 1907.
(3)—Was all the equipment of the road, engines, cars, shops and other assets included in the lease to the Canadian Pacific Railway Company.
(4)—If not, what consideration did the province receive from the C.P.R. for the same?

CITY MET ON TUESDAY AFTERNOON AND APPOINTED COMMITTEES

The City Council elected upon Monday met yesterday and organized, after being sworn in. His Worship Mayor Mitchell was sworn in by His Honor the Lieutenant Governor, being attended by Ald. Osborne and Ald. Everett. The ceremony took place at the office of His Honor. Afterward the mayor swore in the aldermen at the City Hall.

Subsequent to the swearing in, the City Council met and appointed committees. As there is a vacancy in Carleton Ward on account of the death of Ald. elect John Mavor, a vacancy has been left in certain committees. Other committees will be appointed probably at the special meeting called for Friday night.

THE COMMITTEES.

Chairmanships were assigned as expected. Ald. Kitchen is head of the Street Department, Ald. Reid is the chairman of Finance Committee, Ald. Everett retains the chairmanship of the Water Committee, Ald. Ebbett is chairman of the Street Lighting Committee, and Ald. Osborne is chairman of the City Hall Committee, a position he occupied several years ago. The chairmanship of the Fire Committee has been given to Ald. Wilkinson, who has been connected with that committee previously. Ald. Lemont is head of the Wharf Committee.

Wharves and Old Burying Ground—(Open).

Municipal Home—Lemont, chairman; Everett, McKnight, Reid.
Legislation—Everett, Osborne, Reid, Lemont, Wilkinson.
Revisors—Wilkinson, Osborne.

SPECIAL MEETING.

A special meeting of the Council has been called for Friday night. At that time various topics are to be discussed, including ex-Ald. W. E. Farrell's request for a recount of ballots and the date of the election in Carleton Ward.
The purposes of Friday night's meeting are as follows:

To appoint standing and special committees.
To order the pay of the officials conducting elections.

To consider proposed legislation.
To consider the report from the city electrician on the Opera House wiring.

To fix date for election in Carleton Ward to fill the vacancy caused by the death of John Mavor, Esq., alderman-elect.

To consider the communication of W. E. Farrell, asking for a recount of ballots.
