Milwaukee Wis., March 11—All roads for fight fans now lead to this city, where the most promising bout of the year is to be staged tomorrow night with lightweight Champion Willie Ritchie and former Champion Ad. Wolgast as the principals. The fight is expected to show whether Ritchie has come back as a result of his many months of comparative idleness and if Wolgast has come back, as his good showing in his recent bout with Joe Rivers would seem to indicate.

It is now more than four months since Champion Ritchie has been seen in the ring. His last battle was a no-decision affair with Leach. Cross, in New York on November 10. Immediately after the fight with Cross the champion went to California to fulfill an engagement to box ten rounds with Tommy Muroby. This bout was scheduled for December 10, but a few days before that date, Ritchie developed an abscess of the nose and the bout was adjourned until January. Then Ritchie was incapacitated by another slight accident and the go with Murphy was called off.

Many critics are of the same opinion that Wolgast has come back and will give Ritchie a surprisingly hard battle. They point to his showing against Joe Rivers as conclusive proof. Many other close followers of the game, while not caring to venture a prediction of a Wolgast victory are of the opinion that the former champion will be able to stay the ten rounds.

The Ritchie supporters on the other hand, believe that Wolgast will have no chance against the champion. They declare that Ritchie has improved since he defeated Wolgast and copped the title in the battle at Daly City on November 28, 1912. He has the advantage over Wolgast in the matter of age and the age and the confidence that comes of holding the championship. They admit Wolgast's cleverness and his ability to deliver a telling blow, but they are of the opinion that he is no longer able to withstand the punishment that he could assimilate a few years back.

As their respective training camps the two fighters were reported today to be in excellent shape for the battle. Wolgast has kept himself in good trim by his frequent bouts and

needed no severe training to get into shape for tomorrow's contest. Ritchie has been training faithfully since he arrived from the West ten days ago and has succeeded in taking off the surplus flesh.

The fight will take place in the new stadium which will seat ten thousand spectators. Promoter Tom Andrews believes that every seat will be filled when the gang calls the fighters into the ring. Special trains will bring big delegations of fight fans from Chicago. Other delegations are coming from points throughout Wisconsin, Illinois, Michigan, Iowa and States as far distant as North Dakota. The advance sale indicates that the predictions of the largest crowd that ever witnessed a mill in this city are likely to be fulfilled.

EAGER TO KEEP SHAFER

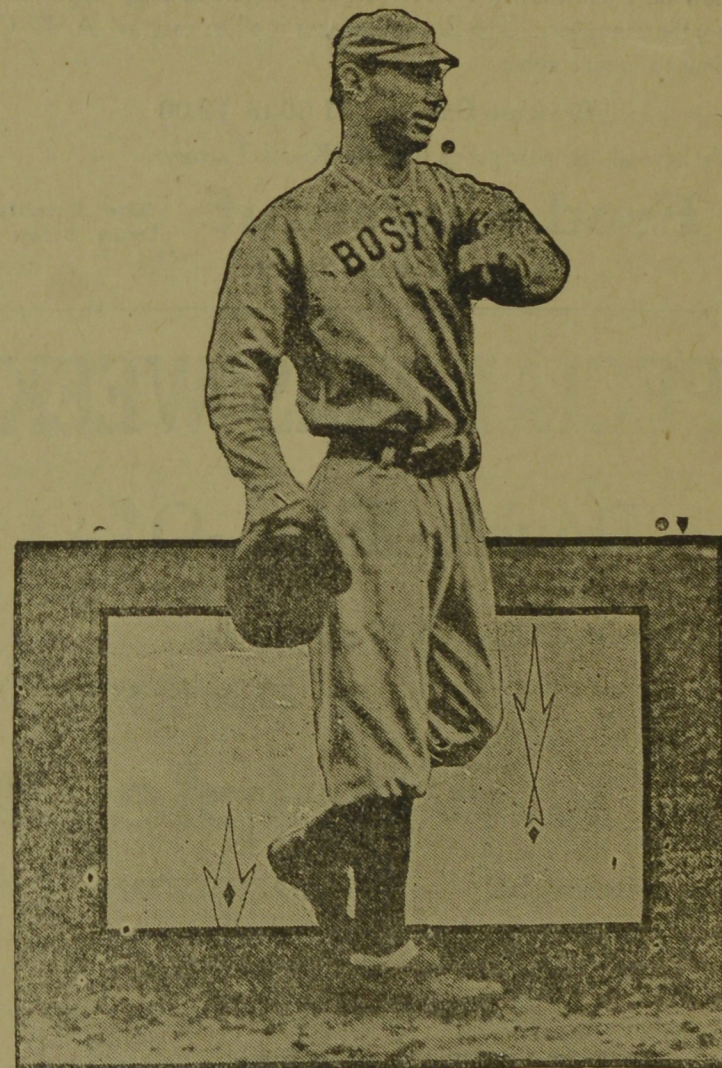
New York, March 9—Pres. Hempstead, of the New York National League Club said tonight that he had not heard officially from third baseman Shafer that the infielder intended to retire.
