EX-CHAIRMAN PARENT ON ON N. T. R. AFFAIRS

Montreal, March 4.—Following the Gutelius report presented to the Ottawa House days ago alleging extravagance in the building of the Transcontinental. Hon. Mr. Parent, the chairman of the first commission, made a statement that the Gutelius-Lynch Staunton report was all at sea. He added that he would like to have the matter gone impartially and said he could carry the war into Africa. Today he comes out with a long list of questions which he would like Major Leonard to answer. They are as follows:—

"It is not true that the actual commission of the Transcontinental Railway consisting of Major Leonard himself alone, effected changes in certain sections of the Transcontinental line which involved a considerable increase in the cost of construction?"

"Is it not true that these changes were contrary to the specific proposition between the Canadian Government and the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway provisions made on July 29, 1903, and confirmed by Act of Parliament?"

"Is it not true that the said commission in concert with the Gutelius-Staunton commission had worked done to the extent of thousands of dol-

lars outside of and in violation of existing contracts?"

"Is it not true, that the said commission bought about one hundred and seventy arpents of land, at a thousand dollars an arpent, as stated for the construction of shops at a distance of more than three miles from the main line?"

"Is it not true, that the existing commission paid a considerable indemnity to the Canadian Northern Quebec Railway for cutting the old Gosford road in two?"

"Is it not true, that a steam ferry to take cars across the river at Quebec, was ordered in England by Major Leonard, at a cost of \$560,000?"

"Is it not true that this order was given illegally?"

"Is it not true that we have factories and equipment in this country capable of turning out a ferry boat such as was required, and all other furnishings for a cost of not more than \$400,000."

"Is it not true that the old Commission was given expert advice to this effect, and was contemplating issuing tenders?"

DR. MICHAEL CLARK SPEAKS AT SARNIA

Sarnia, March 6.—One of the biggest Liberal rallies ever held in the town of Sarnia was that of last tonight, when Dr. Michael Clark of Red Deer, Alta., addressed an audience that packed the building to the doors.

Dr. Clark expressed himself as well pleased at being in the town of Sarnia, which is the home of F. F. Pardee, and is one of the ridings that remained true to the Liberal cause in the election of 1911. "We were not totally submerged," said he, "by the landslide at that time, as was plainly shown during the fight in the House of Commons last winter, when the naval bill was under discussion. During that struggle we were guided by the hands of Sir Wilfrid and Mr. Pardee. We drove our opponents so hard all the time that they were glad when the struggle was over, and we have heard nothing since on the matter. They say that we are disloyal because we did not fall in with a proposal to borrow money to give back again, and that without a Canadian to help man the ships. Should the time come that the flag is threatened we will not only give the \$35,000,000, but will gladly give all we have to protect and keep together the Empire. (Cheers.)

"During the recent election there was considerable flag-waving in Ontario, but that was not the method used with the French in Quebec. Did you ever spend a little time sizing up the flag-wavers, and see if they have any trade with the Yankees?"

ONE SHIP—TEN THOUSAND HOMES

Dr. Clark stated that he would be glad when the battleships could be done away with and remarked the price of one modern ship would build ten thousand comfortable homes throughout the land. This would be a benefit, instead of a machine to kill of mankind.

"During the election," said the speaker, "signs were displayed in Ottawa, 'No truck or Trade With the Yankees.' Still the great railways of the country, owned by English capital, do not kick on hauling American passengers and goods. I sell my cattle in the market at Chicago, and it is the beef that is annexed and not myself. I remain in Canada to raise more cattle for the consumers."

with regard to the Transcontinental provided that preference shall be given where possible to material manufactured in the country?

"Is it not true that the substance of the report given by the Staunton-Gutelius inquiry bears on reports already revised by the Hodgins and Lumsden inquiries, and for the most part rejected by arbitration between the two parties?"

"Is it not true that the principal engineers employed by the old Commission were of different political opinions to the members of the commission?"

"Is it not true that the old commission always chose its employees for their efficiency, without concerning itself with their political views?"

"Is it not true that no final and definite agreement was made with any one contractor by the old commission?"

"Is it not true that the acts of the existing commission are very much akin to those of their predecessors, and should therefore also be examined at the inquiry?"

"For the present I think that this is enough to show that we should inquire into the actions of our successors. We don't fear that comparison which a strict and non-partisan inquiry can draw between our contracts and theirs."

RUMOR INSISTS ON A ROYAL BETROTHAL

London, March 9.—Although an official denial promptly followed upon the heels of the statement published in the columns of The Nea Imera of Athens, that the engagement of the Prince of Wales to Princess Helena of Greece would be announced on the occasion of the visit of the King and Queen of the Hellenes there in April, on the eve of the departure of the British royalties for Paris, yet there is much circumstantial evidence which seems to point to the truthfulness of the news from Athens.

In the first place The Nea Imera is a paper which enjoys the exclusive publication of much court news which is never given out through the usual channels and, while much of this does not bear the official stamp it is often authoritative, having emanated from overheard conversations of court personages.

Besides, it is known here that the Prince of Wales, who will be twenty on June 23 next, will start for his overseas travels in August and that it has been the desire of King George and Queen Mary to have his domestic future cut out for him before he departs.

Moreover, Princess Helens, who will be eighteen on May 2, is both personally and politically considered a most desirable match for the heir apparent to the English throne. She is a tall, graceful girl, a linguist and musician and of a serious, inquiring disposition and possesses other qualities which the Prince of Wales is said to admire.

Her grandfather was the brother of Queen Alexandra, the consort of the late King Edward VII and her mother is a sister of the German Emperor. Her kinship, viewed in the light of the growing importance of Greece in the politics of the Mediterranean and the Levant, makes her perhaps, the most desirable "parti" for the English heir to be found in European courts.

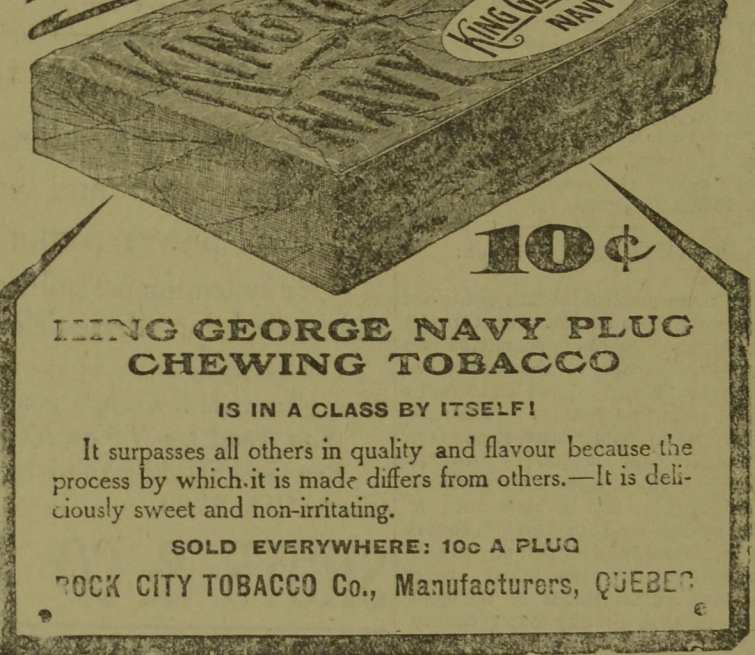
