AT CLEVELAND
YESTERDAYFastest Time for Four-Year-Old Pacer
or by a Stallion Made in 2.05
Pace

Cleveland, Ohio, July 21—Records fell right and left at the second day of the Grand Circuit harness races at North Randall this afternoon. In the first heat of the 2.05 pace, Dr Burns Jr. forced William, champion three-year-old pacer of 1913, to a mark of 2.02, which is a record—or a four-year-old pacer. William did the second heat in 2.02. The two heats are the fastest ever paced by a four-year-old or by a stallion. In the third and final heat of the Ohio stakes, the day's classic, Star Winter established a new mark of 2.05 for the event and also trotted the fastest mile of the year on any track.

Lee Axworthy captured the Fasig three-year-old trot, 2.12 class, in two straight heats. The final heat was done in 2.08 and the first in 2.08, the fastest heat and two heats, the event was ever run in. Aside from the setting of new marks, the chief excitement of the day came with the first race, for 2.15 trotters. The other events were all captured in straight heats. In the first race, after Sterling Hall had won the first heat, Duchess finishing fourth, Duchess took the next three with little trouble.

SYDNEY DROPS
OUT OF CAPE BRETON
BASEBALL LEAGUE
New Waterford and Glace Bay Will
Play Special Series During Balance
of Season

Glace Bay, July 20—The Cape Breton baseball league has chimed its last chime so far as Sydney is concerned, which leaves the two remaining teams New Waterford and Glace Bay to squabble over the championship.

As is well known it would be of no avail for the two teams to form a league and draw up a schedule so it is learned on the best of authority that a post-series of seven games is to be arranged between both teams for a purse and a stipulated amount on each team. The Glace Bay team will be strengthened for the series by the presence of Whittaker and Stone an imported battery that comes well recommended and both teams may secure the services of the disbanded Sydney team. With both teams strengthened and championship and a side bet at stake the fans of Cape Breton may be assured of seeing a brand of ball of the high class variety that would make them forget the ragged exhibitions that have hitherto been put on the market this season.

The Cape Breton baseball league this year contained the seeds of its own destruction. It was a failure from the start and ended a failure. Those who backed the Sydney team during the first few weeks of the league, soon found themselves minus a few hundred dollars and with no prosperous outlook for the future. The result was that they plainly saw that the quicker they got out of it the better for themselves, and they did so.

The teams themselves assumed charge taking a chance on the gate receipts but a person might as well try to run an automobile without gasoline. As making a success of baseball here with foreign powers in charge. Not only did Sydney go in the hole financially, but it is learned that both Glace Bay and Waterford went the same route.

This can be attributed to several causes. First and foremost, from the very outset of the league it was apparent in baseball that interest was entirely lacking. Again the ball players this year could not be compared with those marketed last year and lastly the weather was too cold for both the spectators to attend and for the ball-players to do justice to themselves.

Taken all in all the situation in baseballdom in Cape Breton this year was an absolute failure and unless some enthusiasm is displayed in the coming championship series between Glace Bay and Waterford it looks as if professional ball was a "dead letter" in Cape Breton for the next few years and even if it be resurrected it will be the result of the unstable condition of the league.
