EXTENSIVE CHANGES AT POLICE STATION ARE CONTEMPLATED

Administration of Justice Committee Has Considered Matter--Lattice Cells and Enlarged Court-Room Are in Prospect

Extensive alterations at the police station and police court are contemplated by the Administration of Justice Committee. That body considered the matter at a meeting held Monday night and will deal with it further. Ald. Walker, chairman of the committee, stated this morning that it was considered necessary that some improvements be made.

Some time ago the wooden cells in the police station were condemned as unsanitary and the recommendation made by the health authorities that they be altered. Chief of Police McColm has strongly urged that steel lattice cells be procured and substituted for those now in use. The latter, besides being hard to keep clean, are difficult to heat in the winter time. Steel lattice cells would avoid both of those disadvantages.

The intention also is to rearrange the court-room so as to make use of a dark-room now located between the cells and the present court-room. That room is now useless except as a store-room. This will be made part of the court-room, the magistrate's desk being placed with its back to the windows. A private office for the chief of police could then be provided. At present he is forced to use a corner of that part of the court-room which is reserved for the public.

It is claimed that the efficiency of the police department and police court would be greatly increased by the suggested alterations.

MAINE CAR WENT THROUGH FOX CREEK BRIDGE

Occupants Had Narrow Escape From Death Yesterday Afternoon--Car Hung Balanced on Middle Stringer Of the Bridge

A telephone message from Southamptown says:—A large seven-passenger touring car from the neighboring State of Maine, containing four women and two men went through the Fox Creek bridge right in front of the Ingraham Bros. mill yesterday afternoon. The plank which is very old, and rotten and has been patched up for the past three or four years, gave way and the car with its occupants was left balanced in mid-air on the middle stringer of the bridge. The women screamed and became hysterical.

One man ran to the nearest house for help, which was some distance, as there is a considerable stretch of woods on either side of the bridge. The other man stayed with the women and kept a plank, used as a pry, under the side of the auto next the mill to keep it from tipping over into the stream some fifteen or twenty feet below.

When help arrived the ladies were got out, then the men carried plank from a mill-yard and laid a new covering on each side of the imperiled car. With large poles and timbers which they also carried from the mill-yard they pried up the auto till they could run planks under it. It was a slow and difficult job as with every move the auto would tip and tremble, and once by a work man removing his pry too soon, it came "within an ace" of going over into the great yawning chasm below.

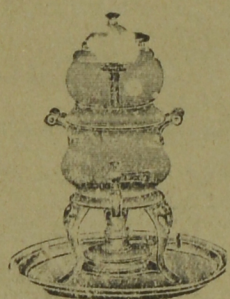
