PROSPECTIVE GOVERNOR WAS ONCE A LIBERAL

(Amherst News.)
On the seventh of March Senator Wood of Sackville, is to be sworn in as governor of New Brunswick, in place of Mr. Tweedie, whose term of office has expired.

Senator Wood having been a Liberal more than one half of his life, is entitled to credit for the good he has done and is open to criticism for what he has left undone. Considering the fact however, that his time and energy were about equally divided between both parties we will deal with him lightly, but a brief reference to his career just at this time will not be out of place.

During the notable N. P. contest of 1878, Mr. Wood was a free trader, a determined opponent of protection and an ardent supporter of the late Sir Albert Smith and ran an election in the Liberal cause.

Lean days for the Liberals were at hand and Mr. Wood suddenly and unexpectedly in 1882 discovered that the free trade tenets of Cobden and Bright of which he had always been an exponent, were noxious inventions of the evil one and he hastily discarded his Liberal compatriots and became a full blown protectionist.

That his conversion was genuine was evidenced by the fact that he ran three elections for the protection party and by means of electoral purity and by elevating the standard of reform as well as by other agencies, he won easily.

Some of Mr. Wood's opponents are cruel enough to say that his elections were rather expensive. With regard to this, we know nothing. He will be chiefly remembered in Amherst owing to the fact that it was through him that the Cape Tormentine Railway was diverted from this town and its terminus located in Sackville. Mr.

Wood was one of the original owners of this railway line and received a grant of \$126,000 from the government for the building of this road, in which he held a half interest, and later he was rewarded with a senatorship. As a commercial venture, Mr. Wood never did better than when he entered the political field, but then his railway subsidy and his senatorship were mere incidents.

Mr. Wood never weighed his own interests in the balance against the public good. In 1886 there was a change and the fat things were all coming the Liberal way. This became decidedly irksome to a man of Mr. Wood's public spirit and patriotism and about four years ago there was serious danger that his political principles would undergo another change; that he would suffer a relapse and become once again a free trader or revenue for tariff man. He is charged with organizing a local ticket in Mr. Emmerson's interest—Mr. Emmerson being at that time minister of railways, and an advocate of the purchase of branch lines, including the Cape Tormentine Railway, by the government. Mr. Wood's fondness for Mr. Emmerson was not limited to generously swapping of his own party; he did not wish to be a dispenser of all the good things going, so he left for Mr. Emmerson the privilege of building all the lighthouses, breakwaters, wharves, public buildings and other works which have been constructed in Westmorland for thirty years or more. The only public works that can be credited to Mr. Wood's long career are the Cape Railway and some Sackville people are unkind enough to say—the Fort Lawrence wharf.

It was "very considerate," as Sam Waller used to remark, for Mr. Wood

to offer to give up his senatorship to Mr. Daniel, M.P., but it rather evidences his strong commercial instincts that he retained the senatorship until he received his commission as Lieutenant Governor. There is no credit, he takes no chances, the goods had to be delivered quite right. Whether Liberal or Conservative, protectionist or free trader, Senator Wood evidently believes that a bird in the hand is worth a good many in the bush. Having belonged to both parties and thus being able to see both sides of this political question, the senator will be able to judiciously weigh evidence and will make a creditable chief magistrate.

STAFF-CAPTAIN JENNINGS RETURNED FROM ENGLAND

Staff Captain Jennings has just returned to Halifax after spending three months in the "Old Land" during which time he travelled extensively through Scotland, lecturing on Nova Scotia, its resources and opportunities. These lectures were largely attended and created considerable interest in this Province. The Staff-Captain succeeded (through the lectures and personal interviews) in interesting a large number of Farmers and Farm-labourers, who will come to Nova Scotia this spring. Some of these men have a small capital, ranging from 150 to 500 pounds. The men will arrive a few at the time on the various boats, during March and April, and will be given situations on arrival.

SAYS NE TEMERE DECREE WILL STAND FOR ALL TIME

Montreal, Feb. 25—Archbishop Bruchesi who pronounced the ecclesiastical decree declaring null the Hebert marriage thus paving the way for the Ne Temere controversy, preached today in St. James' Cathedral. In view of the decision just handed down by Judge Charbonneau in the famous Hebert case, his remarks were heard with unusual interest. His grace said in part:

"The agitation now being carried on from one end of the country to the other, the more or less violent articles appearing in several Protestant newspapers against the wise and beneficent, yet evidently ill-understood legislation of the Catholic Church and a deduction gathered from a recent judgment in the civil courts impose upon me the duty to raise my voice not for the purpose of trying to interpret human laws, but in order once more to solemnly affirm the ever immutable principles of our faith touching the august sacrament of marriage, as well as the sacred legislation of the church which neither jurist, thesis nor the findings of civil tribunals abrogate or modify."

"If governments make laws for the valid and legitimate celebration of marriage, and if these laws contradict those of the church the latter can in no way be affected, for the reason that the faithful and all those to whom the laws of the church apply, will remain loyal unless they want to be excluded from her sacred jurisdiction."

After quoting the Ne Temere decree he proceeded: "So here is this Ne Temere decree with which a scare has been created through the land and which they represent as an attempt to destroy the peace of families, and the liberty of conscience."

"Marriage celebrated outside these essential conditions, is consequently null by the fact, both as regards conscience and religion. That this religion is reasonable, and that it finds support on motives of the very highest order no one can deny, for be it remembered that marriage is not a simple contract submitted as in the case of all other contracts, to the jurisdiction of the civil power. Marriage like all the other Sacraments, belongs to the church, and consequently it belongs to the church to direct everything that concerns the validity of marriage."

"Such was the declaration of the Catholic church before the Protestant reformation, and such will it be in all the time. If, however, our separated brothers have rejected it they have made marriage a simple contract submitted like all others to the civil power which may be dissolved or governed at will, let them at least allow us to remain faithful to our regular traditions, and in the name of that liberty which they claim for themselves, let them permit us to act according to the convictions of our faith."

IOWA ADVERTISING CLUBS

Cedar Rapids, Ia., Feb. 26—The second annual convention of the Associated Advertising Clubs of Iowa met in this city today and was called to order by President Frank Armstrong of Des Moines. The exchange of greetings and routine business occupied the initial session. President Armstrong spoke on "State Organization" this afternoon and papers were presented by W. W. Marsh of Waterloo, on "State Publicity," and S. R. McKelvie of Lincoln, Neb., on "Advertising to the Farmer." The convention will conclude tomorrow.

NOTED ENGLISH PHYSICIAN IN CHICAGO

Chicago, Ill., Feb. 26—Dr. Frederick Hallett, secretary of the examining board of the Royal College of Physicians and Surgeons and one of the foremost medical men in England, is in Chicago in acceptance of an invitation to speak before the Conference on Medical Education and Public Health. 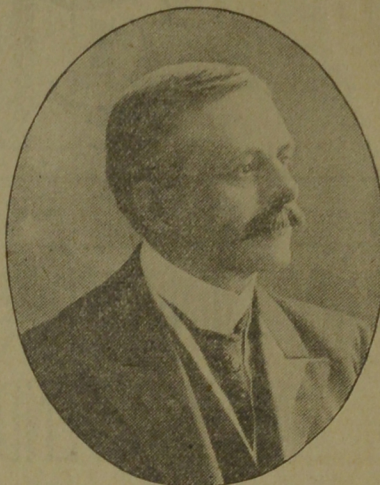

London, Feb. 24—The Bank of Montreal is offering the underwriting of a Canadian Government Conversion Loan of \$5,000,000 3 1/2 per cent stock. The public seems apathetic in the matter. The appetite for Canadians and missions generally has diminished. The Dominion's credit is not impaired and although few want fresh 3 1/2 per cent securities at present, it is expected the issue will meet a fair reception.

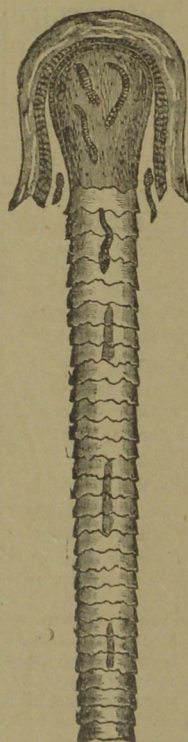
London, Feb. 26—Lord Strathcona, the Canadian High Commissioner, is slowly recovering from his bronchial trouble. His strength grows daily.

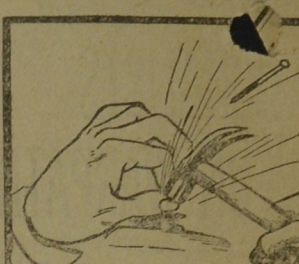
