## MAYOR MITCHELL CONGRATULATED ON INVESTIGATION RESULTS

Circumstances Attending Protest and Investigation Have Increased His Popularity--Attention Can be Given to City Business

His Worship Mayor Mitchell is receiving hearty congratulations today upon the result of the recount of ballots in connection with the Mayoralty protest and the affirmation of the City Council that he holds office in accordance with the law.

The effort to remove Mayor Mitchell and the attacks directed at him since those efforts began have done more to make him known throughout the province than would have been possible by other means. Throughout the county of York the people have watched the incidents connected with the investigation by the City Council with the keenest interest and his popularity in the district where he formerly resided and also in other sections of the county has increased to a marked extent.

About the city the opinion is expressed that the City Council now will have an opportunity of attending to the business of the City, without having attention distracted by an election investigation. In the minds of the public the protest against Mayor Mitchell has no support and further action is not expected.

There is considerable comment that the number of ballots which were found to be improperly marked under the strictest ruling was comparatively small and were distributed between the two mayoralty candidates.

## POST-ENCAENIAL CELEBRATION HAD USUAL FEATURES

U. N. B. Students Burst Their Cannon With First Shot--Enjoyable Dance Held in Gymnasium Early in Evening--Barn Burned

The post-encenial celebration at the University of New Brunswick, took place last night with the usual features. A very enjoyable dance was held in the college gymnasium, beginning at nine o'clock. The chaperones were Mesdames Stiles and McGinnis. After the dance the college boys held the usual celebration. A huge bonfire blazed near the terrace and on the hill back of the Arts Building the cannon was planted to fire the customary shots. With the first shot the cannon burst and for the balance of the night charges of dynamite in trees and rocks and in the ground were used to make noise.

About four o'clock a barn on the opposite side of College Road caught fire from some unknown cause. An alarm was rung in from Box 54, but the alarm system was out of order, and the box number was not registered at the central fire station. The firemen were informed of the location of the fire by telephone and responded but found that the barn was outside the fire limits and the building was destroyed.

The college students, according to the report of the police, committed no depredations about the city and no extra police were on duty.

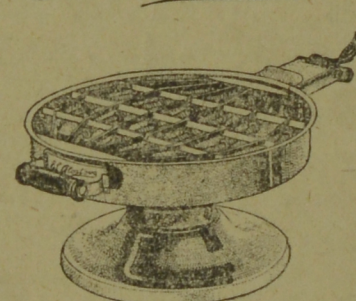

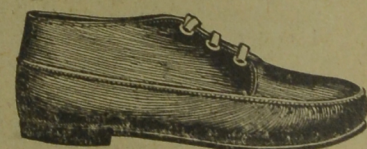
