CHANGE IN LEADERSHIP.

The name of George Offen of this
city, is mentioned in connection with
the leadership of the Milltown Cor-
net Band. The St. Croix Courier of
last week, had the following item
about the Milltown band:—"Owing
to the extensive improvements which
are now being made at the electric
power house at Milltown, Me., it is
stated that the leader of the cornet
band may find it necessary to resign
the leadership, as his time will be
required as foreman of the works." The

September last at the Fredericton
exhibition.

A new night court with civil juris-
diction only has been authorized by
the Legislature for the adjustment
of wage questions affecting employer
and employee in amounts not exceed-
ing \$50 and it is expected the first
court will be opened in this city at
an early date. It will be a "poor
man's court" in a strict sense, for
men and women having claims for
unpaid wages or questions of dispute
relating to employment or dismissal
may obtain free summonses upon
making affidavit that they are not
possessed of means exceeding \$100.
They may plead their cases in per-
sons if unable to hire a lawyer.
The court will be opened from 7.30
to 11 P.M. every night except Sun-
day.

more important of them were obvi-
ously interested in hydro-power pro-
positions. In one case in particular,
a member posed as a public benefac-
tor in his opposition to the dam-
ming the St. John river, claiming it
would ruin the fisheries of the bay
and harbor. His intentions may have
been all right and his arguments
sound, but both would have come
better from somebody who was not
soliciting for an opposition power
company that was looking to the
whole New Brunswick field for a mar-
ket for its electric current. There
was a good deal of talk in the lob-
bies of the legislature concerning
this and the foreshores bill, which
while introduced by Premier Flem-
ming who thus made his whole gov-
ernment responsible for the iniqui-
tous measure, was promoted by a St.
John member who represents various
large interests.

NEPOTISM RAMPANT.

"This, although but little of the
whole story has been told will give
a fair idea of how a member and
particularly a legal member can use
his position in the legislature to ad-
vance his own clients. The Indepen-
dence of Parliament Acts has not
been respected by many of the re-
presentatives and has been violated
scores of times since this party came
into power. Nepotism has reigned
supreme and the relatives of govern-
ment members and government sup-
porters have flourished as never be-
fore; needless officials and holders
through the rooms of the legislature,
and the departments; the salaries of
the executive beginning with the pre-
mier have been increased beyond
reason for the services rendered and
all the important pledges of the
Hazen platform which so appealed to
the people in 1908 have been broken.
Who were so taken with that plat-
form? "I wonder how many of the people
form remember its planks? Just at
this moment the first four of them
and the most important four of them
are worth quoting;

(1) "If returned to power we will
put all public works to public tender
and award the contracts for the
same to the lowest tenderers.

(2) "We will conduct and carry
on a government free from all party
lines, political bias and prejudice.

(3) "We will repeal the present
highway act and enact a new law in
its place which will vest the man-
agement of the roads and the
appointment of all officials, abso-
lutely in the county councils.

(4) "We will have a survey and
a valuation of our crown lands
made so that this valuable asset
may be conserved."

"The last of these planks will cer-
tainly appeal to the public mind
at the present moment. The crown
lands do seem to have been con-
served but for whose benefit the
investigation to be held in the near
future will no doubt determine.

PROMISES FLOUTED.

"Hon. Mr. Morrissey has openly re-
pudiated 'The public works by public
tender' plank and the people may
fairly be allowed to judge as to the
affairs of the government being con-
ducted free from political bias and
prejudice. As to the roads law as
at present constituted it is simply a
cog in the Tory political machine.
The parish supervisors have all au-
thority over the roads and they are
appointed by the members of the
legislature for the county wherein
they are located. All control of the
roads that the county councils ever
had has been taken away from
them.

"I am referring to these broken
pledges simply to show how lightly
the members and supporters of this
government seem to regard their re-
sponsibilities to the people who placed
them in power. That same care-
lessness of responsibility has paved
the way for abuses of a grosser na-
ture, for trifling with the good name
and honor of the province and has
given rise to such irregularities as
have made the serious charges of Mr.
Dugal possible."

CONVICTION MADE.

Conviction against Thomas Feeney
in the third offense Scott Act case
against the Lorne Hotel, was made
this morning by Police Magistrate
Marsh. The case was adjourned till
Thursday for the preparation of cer-
tificates of first and second offences.
P. A. Guthrie appeared for the de-
fendant and R. B. Hanson for the
crown. Adjournment till tomorrow
was made in the case of Bert Lint,
who was convicted last week in the
third offense case against the City
Hotel.

TWO MORNING TRAINS.

After May 31, according to the an-
nouncement made at St. John by
Supt. H. C. Grout of the C.P.R., the
suburban train leaving St. John will
be run through to Fredericton Junc-
tion, connecting with the train that
arrives here at 11.30. This will make
two morning trains from St. John
to Fredericton. The proposal to run
two daily trains between St. John
and Montral has not been followed
out.
