UP TO STRENGTH.

No. 3 Station, Royal Canadian Regiment, in this city, is not taking on any more recruits at present, being up to authorized strength, which is forty-nine of all ranks.

ALLOWANCE INCREASED.

The Militia Department has increased the allowance paid for horses used by the active militia during training. The allowance now is \$1.25 per day, together with free issue of forage. The same allowance is to be paid for draught horses and saddle-horses.

SCHOOLS TO REOPEN.

The city schools will reopen on Wednesday. During the Easter recess all the school buildings have been fumigated by the Board of Health officials on account of the prevalence of measles and scarlet fever.

GETS A GOLD WATCH.

Mr. R. E. Armstrong, who is retiring from the editorship of The St. Andrew's Beacon, to become secretary of the St. John Board of Trade, was presented with a gold watch by his fellow townsmen on Saturday as a token of their esteem.

MUST CARRY UNION JACK.

According to a militia order recently promulgated, any militia band may appear in uniform and play in any procession or at any demonstration not connected with the militia provided that a Union Jack not smaller than three by four feet is carried.

MUNICIPAL REVENUE.

Mr. J. R. Brown of New York, a noted expert on Tax Reform, will address a public meeting on Municipal Revenue at the Board of Trade Office on Wednesday evening. Mr. Brown has lectured on several occasions on Tax Reform in St. John recently and is considered a very forcible speaker.

PREACHED AT FAIRVILLE.

The pulpit of the Fairville Baptist church was filled yesterday by Rev. Dr. W. C. Kierstead of Fredericton, who preached both morning and evening. At the conclusion of the morning service, Rev. H. R. Boyer, who is acting pastor until the vacancy is filled, administered the ordinance of baptism to ten candidates and after the evening service he extended the hand of fellowship to four other candidates.

NEW FENCE NOT NEEDED.

It is said that the contract price for the new fence which Mr. P. A. Guthrie decided to have erected round the Normal School was \$4,600. Mr. Pinder, after looking over the situation, came to the conclusion that the present fence was quite adequate and he advised against replacing it. Mr. Pinder's advice was backed up by a scarcity of cash in the provincial chest and was accepted by the government.

AWARDED LARGE CONTRACT.

Powers & Brewer have been awarded by the C.P.R. the contract for the substructure of Weymouth bridge over the Sissibou River on the Dominion Atlantic Railway. This is one of the largest and most important on the D.A.R., the substructure consisting of twelve massive concrete piers, including one draw pier and two abutments. The contractors are arranging to start the work at once and the whole work will be completed this season.

LARGE CUT OF
BANK LOGS BUT
LIGHT DEMAND NOW

Upwards of Five Million Feet Cut
Along River Between Woodstock
and Fredericton---Some Lots Purchased in Early Winter

A large cut of bank-logs along the St. John River between Woodstock and Fredericton has been made during the past winter and there will be busy times at Springhill during the early part of the summer as a consequence. Unfortunately although there has been a heavy cut of bank-logs, the lumber-market is very dull and prospects for improvement are not of the best. During the early part of the winter some lots of bank-logs were bought at prices ranging from \$14 to \$10. At present, however, there is no demand for them and there is not a bright outlook for the rafting season.

The total cut of logs will be upwards of 5,000,000. Fraser Limited, John E. Moore and Randolph & Baker have contracted for about one million each. The York & Sunbury Milling Company and W. D. Gunter have smaller lots. The balance is yet to be sold.

APPEAL COURT.

The April sittings of the Appeal Court will open tomorrow morning. The Fredericton election case, in which an order was lately granted by Judge Barry, will come up for argument at this term.

Mrs. George McEwan, of Saint Mary's formerly Miss Eva Carruthers is to be operated on at the Victoria Public Hospital for internal trouble.

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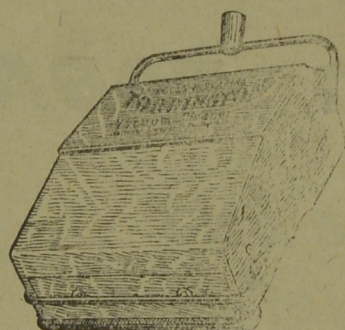
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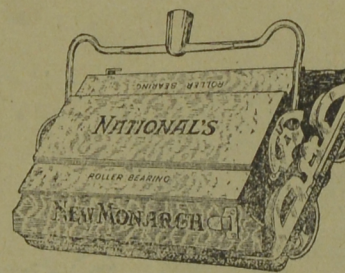
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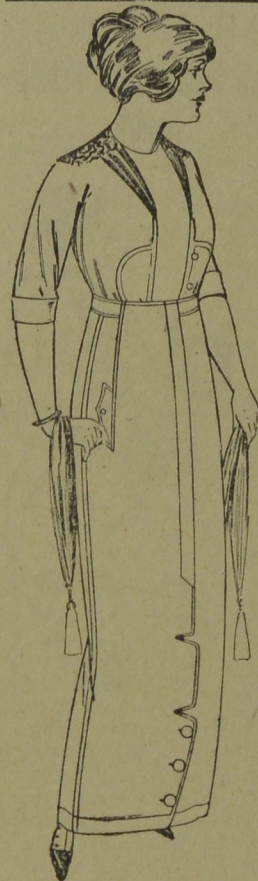

Veteran clubwomen have been surprised to learn that the Mrs. Dore, who has been appearing in vaudeville in this city, is none other than Mrs. Dore Lyon, who a few years ago was one of the most widely known clubwomen in the entire country. Mrs. Lyon was one of the founders of the Federation of Women's Clubs. She was the possessor of a large fortune until 1910, when all she had was swept away in Wall Street. At that time her debts were put at upwards of half a million dollars. Only a few years previously her husband who was a well known builder, had failed for a was Kate Claxton, the noted actress. Besides devoting much of her time to women's clubs, Mrs. Lyon at one time edited "The Clubwoman" and in 1903 she wrote and published a novel which met with considerable success. Several years ago she announced that she was going to retire from club life and take up the stage. Her present vaudeville engagement, however, marks her first professional appearance in this city.

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
