also did the complainant, H. M. Blair, secretary public works. Several witnesses were examined but the evidence on the two sides of the case differed materially.

The evidence of the defence was to the effect that the car running at a low rate of speed, was coming down Queen street early last night. At the City Hall crossing, to avoid running down pedestrians, Mr. Nelson took to the right of the street and then observed complainant's car in front of him. Complainant then pulled across in front of defendant's car. The defence stated that it was absolutely necessary for him to cross to the wrong side to avoid accident.

The case of the complainant was that the defendant, coming in his car in a direction opposite to that of the complainant's car, had crossed from the right to the wrong side of the road, directly in front of the complainant's car, with the result that an accident was narrowly averted.

MR. NELSON'S STATEMENT.

Mr. Nelson, in summing up his case, urged that there was no negligence on his part and cited a decision of the late Chief Justice Tuck on an appeal of the case of Adams vs Stout, in which negligence had been alleged, but had not been upheld on the appeal. Mr. Nelson spoke highly of Chief McCollom and Policeman Marshall for their courteous manner in informing him that he was to appear in court in the morning. As far as the complainant's conduct at the time was concerned, he must say that he acted as if under strong excitement. Perhaps it could hardly be said that he was intoxicated. He, (the defendant) had had little to say to him, merely waving him away. The case attracted much attention, many spectators being in the court.

SCIENCE AND FORESTRY

Elimination of Wood Waste Will Save Country Many Thousands of Dollars

It has been estimated that in converting logs into finished lumber and lumber products, the waste amounts to over 50 per cent. of the bulk of all trees cut for lumber. This is equivalent to an annual loss of from \$10 to \$15 for every man, woman and child in the country. At present it is impracticable from a financial standpoint to reduce this waste as there is no market for the tree tops, culls and weed-trees left in lumbering operations, and only a very limited one for the bark, slabs, sawdust, edgings and trimmings of milling operations.

The Department of the Interior is recruiting the staff of its Forest Products Laboratories, recently established in connection with the Forestry branch, with skilled mechanical and chemical engineers and by constant experimentation it is hoped to find a commercial use for these products.

Timber has often been shunned as a structural material because no reliable figures regarding its strength were available, and when complete tests have been made it is regarded as certain that a demand will be created for some of Canada's tree species which are now left in the woods as valueless.

The Forestry Branch of the Department of the Interior, Ottawa, of which these laboratories are one development, has recently issued a circular describing the various lines of investigation to be followed at these laboratories. Not the least important will be to develop chemical methods for utilizing minor wood wastes and another circular written by the engineer in charge of this work deals with the general aspects of the subject. A large percentage of the small-sized waste wood can be utilized by the process known as "destructive distillation," but the machinery employed in this process is not very efficient. The manufacture of ethyl alcohol and producer gas from sawdust has already been proved feasible, and the securing as Superintendent of the Laboratories of John S. Bates, B.A., B.Sc., one of the foremost authorities on wood-pulp manufacture in America, ensures the development of this Branch of Wood Utilization.

PROWESS WITH SWORD

Corporal-Major Grainger Showed King a Few Tricks

Among those who displayed their prowess before the King at a Life Guards' assault-at-arms was Corporal-Major Grainger, who has won the title of the best man of arms (dis-mounted) in the British army. Perhaps the best of his performances is the one that may be termed the razor trick. He takes a thin staff of wood about the size of a broom-handle, and suspends it resting on two slips of thin paper. The rolls of paper are themselves suspended on the cutting edge of razors which are held by his assistant. The corporal-major, with one clean sweeping cut, slices the "broom-handle" in two and leaves the paper uncut by the razors.

Equally smart is another feat. Taking three or four bars of lead, each about 10 inches long and three inches thick he tosses them in the air, and as they fall, passes his sword through them with the facility of a grocer cutting cheese. He has acquired a sense of balance and weight that is quite wonderful, as is instanced when he takes a heavy cavalry sword and neatly slices into strips an apple held on the extended hand of an unconcerned trooper.

Saves Work on Farm
