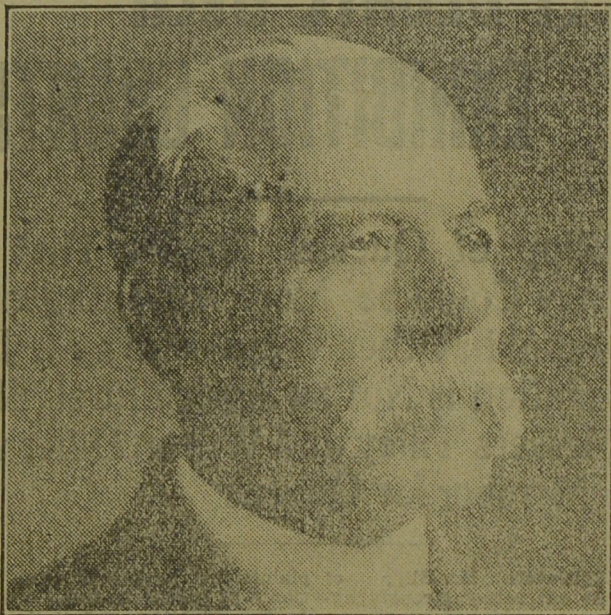

It seems that one cause of the scarcity of Americans in London this year is because dogs are required to pass through quarantine before entering England. The owners object to this regulation and rather than submit to it, prefer to remain on the continent. Recently Miss Emerline Grigsby, the ward of the late Charles T. Yerkes, came to grief in her attempt to smuggle a \$5,000 pet into England. Some one informed the authorities of her intention and she will be compelled to pay a fine in addition to having her dog taken to quarantine.
