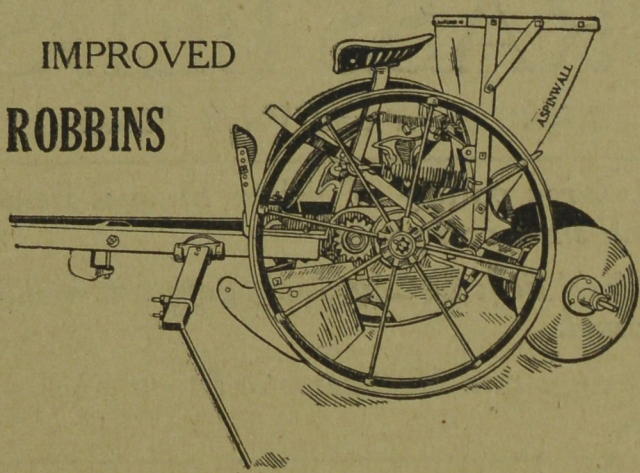

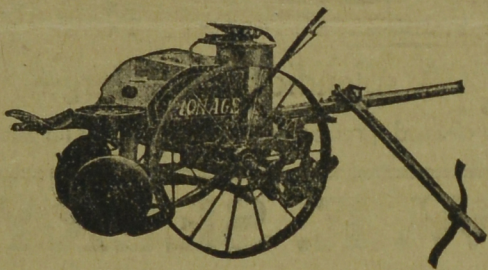

The score last night was twenty five to eighteen in favor of Dal the visitors having a big advantage in height and weight and also getting the better of the breaks in luck. The game was watched by a fair-sized crowd who saw a fast and rough game.

U. N. B. was weakened by the absence of Alexander the regular centre who was replaced by Burden. In the second half the home team was further weakened by the retirement of "Doc" Laughlin who was severely injured. Bob Melrose finished the game in his place.

U. N. B. LED AT FIRST

During the first half the teams worked hard but U. N. B. had a decided advantage leading ten to five at half time. The margin of five points was made up by two field goals and one penalty.

In the second half Dalhousie pulled up the five point lead being a small one. Eight field goals was the principal item in their twenty points scored in this period. U. N. B. scored

only four field goals. Creighton was the big noise in the scoring line on the Yellow and Black team scoring five field goals and one penalty. Jago led the U. N. B. five in scoring finding the basket from the floor on five occasions. Dal had a fair combination but the weight, height and aggressiveness of the players was the principal factor in gaining the victory the U. N. B. combination being badly broken up.

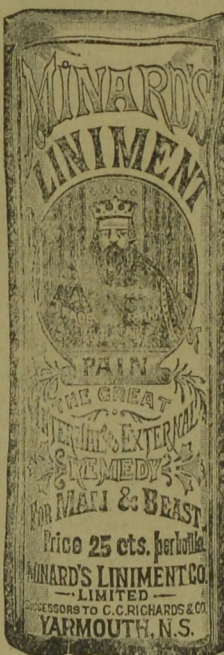
COLLINS SIGNS WITH RED SOX FOR TWO YEARS

TO PLEASE THE KING.

New York, March 12—A special London cable to the New York World says:—

The Home Rule situation continues to absorb all political interest. The Irish leaders assured a correspondence in the House of Commons last night that Premier Asquith's proposal of Monday represented the utmost limit of any concession to which he would go, and that the Government's attitude was now adamant against all further concessions or modifications.

The Opposition at present declares that it is impossible to accept the proffered concessions so a deadlock has been reached for the present.

The Government intends now to proceed with the Home Rule Bill leaving it to the Opposition to decide whether they will have the Bill with plebiscite scheme.

It is an open secret that this temporary exclusion scheme was solely to please the King, who advised that an effort be made to meet the Ulster objections."

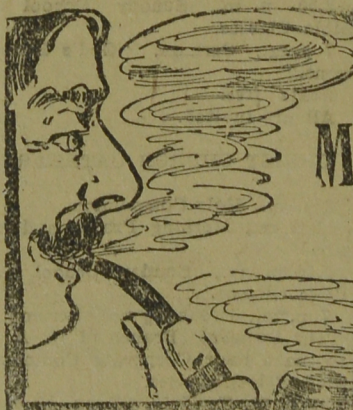

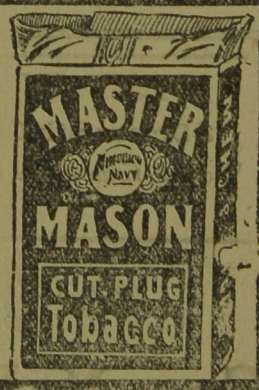
