CORNELIUS VANDERBILT GETS HOME IN FIFTH AVE.

(NEW YORK SUN)

Cornelius Vanderbilt, oldest surviving son of the late Cornelius Vanderbilt, it became known today, inherits the beautiful Vanderbilt mansion at 640 Fifth Avenue, corner of Fifty-first street, following the death of George W. Vanderbilt in Washington last Friday. The house, which is one of the most beautiful of the Fifth Avenue palaces cost \$1,600,000 when built by William H. Vanderbilt. Since then it has had many extensive improvements made to it and now contains the Vanderbilt art collection in addition to many other priceless objects of art.

The mansion was left to George Vanderbilt for life, with the stipulation that upon his death it should go to his eldest son if he had any. In case he did not have a son the house was then to go to the eldest son of the late Cornelius.

William H. Vanderbilt, the eldest son of Cornelius, however, died of typhoid fever in his junior year at Yale, and the second son, Cornelius who was born Sept. 5, 1873 now becomes the owner.

Some nine years ago, however, the mansion was leased for ten years by Henry C. Frick, who now occupies it. It was hinted at the time George Vanderbilt leased the house only in pique because the city insisted upon his tearing down a porte cochere

which he was building in front of it. Frick's lease expires next year, and The Evening Sun is informed that, instead of renewing the lease, Cornelius Vanderbilt will occupy the house himself and give a series of elaborate entertainments.

The house is one of the best suited mansions in Fifth Avenue for entertainments and in addition to the Vanderbilt pictures is beautifully furnished with art objects which it has taken years to collect.

From the vestibule, the stained glass and mosaic work of which was made by Fieschi of Venice, one passes through bronze doors which came from the palace of the Prince of San Donato into a court which reaches the length of the house. The ceiling of this huge court is the roof of the house.

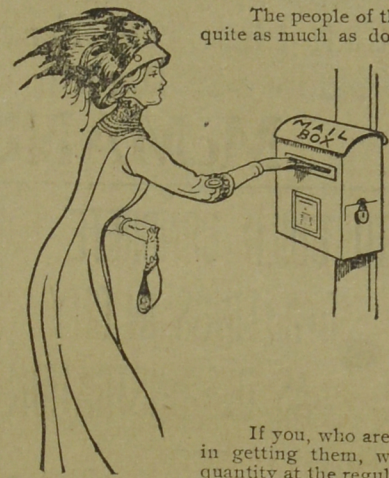
One striking feature of the court is a large mantelpiece of red marble and bronze over an open fireplace. The mantel reaches to the first gallery and is supported by life-sized figures.

The drawing room, the decorations of which were designed by Gallari in Paris, has woodwork carved by some of the master carvers of Europe.

The picture gallery is 32x48 feet, is three stories high and is the largest room in the house, of which there are no two alike. The collection of paintings that the gallery contains cost more than \$1,000,000.

PROPOSES CARSON FOR PREMIER OF IRELAND

London, March 12—"Why should not Sir Edward Carson himself be first Premier of Ireland?" This is the suggestion seriously made by the associate editor of the Ministerial Daily Chronicle this morning above his own initials. He adds—

"Mr. Redmond would be delighted to acquiesce for his ardent desire is to yoke every Irishman, irrespective of creed, to the task of building up a new Ireland."

The difficulties of any form of exclusion for Ulster, whether Premier Asquith's temporary exclusion by counties or Sir Edward Carson's permanent exclusion by the Province become daily more apparent. It is generally understood that the Nationalist leaders yesterday told Mr. Lloyd George and the Cabinet through him that they cannot move an inch further in the way of compromise. To do so would be to lose the support of the Nationalists who form nearly half the population of Ulster itself and to desert Nationalists everywhere.

The question paper off the House of Commons today contain twenty questions to Premier Asquith, indicating the municipality of the complications of Ulster exclusion in any form especially in regard to finance, customs and education.

The Nationalists of Derry say it is incredible that Bishop Tohill of Belfast, Cardinal Logue of Armagh or Bishop MacHugh, of Londonderry, should ever consent as part of the bargain to a plebiscite scheme which would allow us to eat into their respective dioceses, and supplant them in educational and other vital matters by some administrative board.

PROTESTANTS OUTSIDE ULSTER

These Nationalists declare that the assent of Mr. Devlin and these prelates can only be obtained by the conviction that Premier Asquith's scheme will never become law and is only designed to illustrate to the British electorate the unreasonableness of Ulster and the inevitability of the treatment of Ireland as one and indivisible.

Moreover the outburst of organic feeling in Londonderry Tyrone and Fermanagh where the Nationalist vote just predominates makes it most unlikely that men who have never surrendered to force of arms from the days of James Second will now passively surrender to a few votes in a ballot box.

The Times says any settlement which leaves this mass of Protestants outside excluded Ulster, and brings them under a Nationalist Parliament in Dublin will assuredly encourage rather than avert bloodshed.

THE NEED FOR UNITY.

Lord Curzon speaking with almost unequalled authority as a British proconsul, earnestly pleads in the Times for British unity, in the face of events now passing in Europe. He says—

"Without wishing to attach undue importance to the war scare apparently engaging the attention of the German press, it is none the less true that it indicates that the European atmosphere is sufficiently electric to render it highly undesirable that anything should occur which in case of need, would prevent the Government of this country from speaking in the councils of Europe in the name of a united people."

WANT IRISHMEN TO FRAME BILL.

London, March 12—Opposition and Liberal pacers devote much space this morning to the conference held at Downing Street yesterday between prominent Irish Nationalist members and Cabinet Ministers on the offer by Sir Edward Carson, the Ulster leader, to submit the latest Home Rule proposal to an Ulster Council if the time limit for the exclusion of certain Ulster counties were omitted.

Among those present were: Premier Asquith the Chief Secretary for Ireland, the Rt. Hon. Augustine Birrell, the Chancellor of the Exchequer, the Rt. Hon. David Lloyd George, John Redmond and John Dillon.

Assertions are made that the Government in offering that the nine counties of Ulster be permitted to vote on the question of accepting or rejecting Home Rule before the law becomes operative and in case of rejection to remain outside the jurisdiction of the Irish Parliament for

six years has not yet said its last word on the subject, and yet further concessions to the Orangemen will be made.

The best informed Liberals take a contrary view. These hold that the offer is final and that the Unionists must accept or reject the conciliation in the form in which it has been offered. Otherwise the Home Rule Bill will be passed into law in its present form, a result which would mean rejoicing among the Nationalists.

The Daily Graphic which as a Unionist power, utterly condemns the Home Rule Bill says—

"If a measure really solving the Irish problem is to be produced Irishmen themselves must frame it. As long as Irishmen allow themselves to be made the sport of English politicians nothing can be done."

The Daily Chronicle Liberal hits a similar ideal. It says—

"If Sir Edward Carson could bring himself to have a conference with Mr. Redmond he would be able to get for Ulster almost any terms he pleased, provided the integrity of Ireland
