GERMAN TROOPS ARE DRIVEN BACK

night and today, also in Herzegovina and it was stated not a single Austrian remains in Serbia.

Montreal, Aug. 11.—The ocean route is clear from Montreal to Liverpool and any ship can sail when she pleases in perfect safety.

This announcement was made today by R. S. White, collector of customs. The news had been sent him officially from Ottawa, and its result should be pronounced in the easing of insurance and exchange on cargoes, with the result that the wheat now held in Montreal harbor should speedily start on its way to Liverpool. In addition to this it will mean that for the present at any rate there will be little delay or difficulty in the sailing of passenger vessels from Montreal and Quebec.

TO GUARD TRADE ROUTE

Ottawa, Aug. 11.—The reports received here this morning that the wreckage of a war vessel had been picked up off the coast of California caused a little uneasiness in view of the fact that there was some doubt as to the whereabouts of the Rainbow. The government was re-assured this afternoon, however, by the receipt of a message stating that the Rainbow was sighted off Vancouver Island.

No official confirmation has been received in regard to the reported wreckage, but it is feared that it might be from one of the British gunboats, the Algerian or the Shearwater which were last reported off the Mexican coast. Either of these small war vessels would be easy prey to any German cruiser.

A report received this afternoon states that a large German cruiser was sighted off California and this is apparently a new arrival on the Pacific coast. According to the description published, she is much larger vessel than the Leipzig, and as far as is known there is no British cruiser on this side of the Pacific which is at present able to cope with her.

It is probable that the Rainbow will be kept for the present fairly close to its home station in Esquimaut.

The cruiser Drake was reported off the Gulf of St. Lawrence this afternoon and her presence will increase the safety of British shipping on the Atlantic coast. The Drake is a powerful cruiser, of 14,900 tons, speed 23 knots, and nine hundred crew. She is much larger than any German cruiser so far reported on this side of the Atlantic.

The militia department, through its wireless station on top of the headquarters building here, is constantly picking up messages from the Atlantic coast. It has a range of five hundred miles and some of the code messages from the German cruisers, warning German merchant vessels, have been picked up here.

Although the enrolment list of volunteers will close tomorrow night, it is intimated that any trained men who have been prevented, by absence or for other reasons, from putting in their applications, will be still afforded an opportunity to enlist.

The Drake is an armored cruiser built in 1903, with a speed of twenty-four knots an hour, her engines developing 30,000 horsepower. She is armed with two 9.2 and 16 inch guns. Her displacement is 14,000 tons. The Drake is taken as the typical ship of her class, of which there are now only four in the British navy. She is considerably bigger than the Essex, which has been doing such excellent police work in the Atlantic and which was built in the same year, but has a tonnage of 9,800, an indicated horsepower of 22,000 and a speed of half a knot less than the Drake, while her main armament consists of 14.6-inch guns.

The Drake is also very much larger than the two Canadian ships of this majesty's navy. The Niobe, a first class protected cruiser, has a displacement of 11,000 tons, a speed of 21 knots, and a horse-power of 16,500 while her armament is 16 6-inch guns. She was built in 1898.

MAY FIGHT ON THE ATLANTIC.

Portland, Me., Aug. 11.—Code messages picked up this morning by a local wireless operator indicate a sea fight is imminent, probably off the north coast of Nova Scotia in the steamer lane.

One of the interrupted wireless dispatches was from the British cruiser Lancaster via Cape Race and addressed to the battleship Britannia, care of Halifax. The Britannia is from the first home fleet, heavily armored with four 12 inch 9.2 guns and a strong secondary battery.

Other British warships that Portland has heard off in North Atlantic waters lying in wait for German and French fighting ships are the cruisers Essex, Suffolk, Berwick, Aboukir and the light cruiser Bristol.

Beside these the German steamer Kohn, arriving at Boston today from Bremen, reports that six days out she passed the cruiser Drake and the next day the battleship Venerable. She also heard the Essex and sighted

the Suffolk. All this is taken to indicate a massing of much strength on the trans-Atlantic route.

NO HOSTILE SHIPS.

NEW YORK, AUG. 12.—ACTING BRITISH CONSUL NOSWORTHY THIS AFTERNOON SAID THAT HE HAD BEEN ADVISED BY REAR ADMIRAL CRADDOCK ON BOARD THE BRITISH CRUISER SUFFOLK THAT THE WESTERN ATLANTIC OCEAN IS CLEAR OF WARSHIPS HOSTILE TO BRITISH SHIPPING IN THE AREA AS FAR SOUTH AS TRINIDAD. THE ADMIRAL INFORMED THE CONSUL THAT THERE WERE FIVE BRITISH WARSHIPS IN THE WESTERN ATLANTIC OCEAN WHICH HAS BEEN THOROUGHLY PATROLLED. BRITISH SHIPPING AGENTS HAVE BEEN ADVISED THAT THERE IS NO DANGER TO THEIR SHIPS.

WAS THE KAISER SHOT?

New York, Aug. 11.—A wireless message was picked up tonight that the Kaiser had been shot in the right thigh at Aix La Chapelle. The message said that the wound was not serious but would require the Emperor to remain in bed for a week or ten days. It gave no further details.

GERMANS HURLED BACK.

Paris, Aug. 12.—It is officially announced that German Cavalry which had reached a point near Tongres, Belgium has been hurled back by French Cavalry.

BANK RATE LOWER.

London, Aug. 12.—The Bank of England discounted heavily at five per cent.

WILL HELP GERMANS.

London, Aug. 12.—News agency despatch from Berlin says Roumania has decided to help Germany and will invade Russia.

DESTROYED BY MINE.

London, Aug. 12.—A Copenhagen correspondent of Daily Mail says: It is ascertained that the German troop boat destroyer which was reported to have sunk by explosion of one of her boilers off South Gedersedk on August 5th was really destroyed by mine laid by warship.

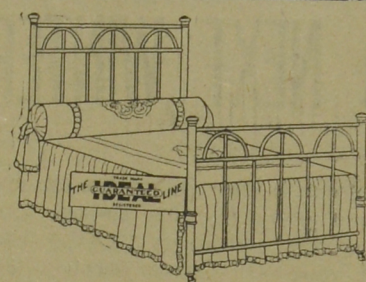

HOSPITAL SHIP FUND
NOW REACHES \$1200

NEW BRIDGE TO SPAN OHIO RIVER

Pittsburgh, Pa., Aug. 12.—The Chesapeake and Ohio Railway Company has selected a point about eight miles above Portsmouth, O., as the site of its proposed bridge over the Ohio River. As planned, the bridge will consist of two cantilever spans, each seven hundred and fifty feet long, and twenty-four plate girder spans, each eighty feet, making a total length of 3420 feet. It will involve about twenty thousand tons of steel and the estimated cost is about two million dollars.
