CANADIAN MAKES WORLD'S RECORD AT BISLEY MEET

Corp. Martiner put on Score of 73 at 1200 Yards—England won Elcho Challenge Shield

London, July 13—On Saturday Corporal Mortimer of Quebec City, made a world record and won the first prize of \$150 in the King's-Norton competition, an open match for four prizes amounting to \$250, given by the King's-Norton Metal Company, Ltd., of King's-Norton, near Birmingham and Abbeywood. The distance was 1,200 yards, 15 shots, and Mortimer's score was 73, consisting of 11 centrals, 3 bull's eyes and a magpie. He tied with Henry, of the Irish Royal Artillery. In shooting off the tie Mortimer secured two centrals and an inner, thus beating his opponent.

Saturday's heavy program included the competition for The Daily Graphic silver cup and sketches worth fifty guineas and ten guineas respectively and 150 cash prizes amounting to £275. These were contested under ideal conditions as regards weather. The competition is in the service rifle championship aggregate, seven shots at 200 yards.
