to the province all the monies he collects. That being the case, why is clear to paying for the lawyers of the man who is found guilty, he can surely be justified in paying the bills of the solicitor and counsel of Mr. Dugal, a member of the legislature, whose courage and devotion to duty saved New Brunswick from further disgrace and probable ruin.

TIME FOR ACTION.

But, gentlemen, while, through diligence and investigation, the sins of Flemming and his government have been exposed and brought home to them, nothing can be accomplished unless that same diligence continues in a greater degree and is practised by every supporter of the government. It will mean the hardest kind of work but if we work in the right direction to free our province from the hands of corrupt men and to place its affairs upon an honest business like basis, the reward of the approval of the people will be worth the effort.

We must not expect and our friends and supporters must not expect that extravagance and corruption will continue under a change of government. We must hew to the line—the hordes of office holders must go and only enough retained to carry on the business. Willard H. Berry at liberty today? Why does not the attorney general do his sworn duty, when, through the press, specific charges are made against this man.

Where is the acting minister of lands and mines, Hon. Mr. Murray of King's county, or is he only a figure-head, and is Mr. Flemming running his department just as much as ever he did? The day will come when the people will want to know these things. They will want to know why Flemming, really under a serious charge and suspension, but nominal under leave of absence, is permitted to draw his salary of \$5,000 a year and why, too, he was able to persuade the government that the people should pay the lawyers who defended him before the Royal Commission. Before the investigation started, Hon. Mr. Clarke informed me that the government did not intend to pay the law-

yers upon either side. Taking him at his word, some of our friends contributed about one-third of the actual expense Mr. Dugal's lawyers incurred. When the war broke out no further effort was made. Since then I learned that Mr. Teed's bill of \$2,300 and Mr. Fowler's bill of \$2,000 were paid in part and I then advised Mr. Dugal that the bills of his lawyers should be sent in to the government. If the attorney general can see his way out of the province. With this economy in spite of the heavy obligations placed upon the province by dishonesty and recklessness, we may escape direct taxation.

Patronage has been called the curse of politics. There is no doubt that it is a great evil. In this province Patronage has cheated us of hundreds of thousands of dollars. It has robbed the people of good roads and effected the efficiency of every public service it has touched. To get rid of this political pap—this patronage which serves to bribe people to vote against their judgment and which undermines the principles of men—should be the aim of any future government. Let us hew to the line—place all power in the hands of the people, wherever possible—take the public services out of politics, and we will be moving in the right direction. The evils of patronage have been accumulated within a few months. We all thought it bad enough when it was used to persuade voters, to carry favor, to keep political parties in power, and to fill the pockets of political friends, but when we see the sacred feeling of patriotism called to its aid, when we see the dire need of the empire, and the unbounded loyalty of the people used as an excuse for furnishing patronage for political hangers-on, then patronage is a curse indeed. I do not need to mention any or many of the things that have been done under the guise of patriotism. You can find it even under the shadow of the Patriotic Fund, and in the assistance to the Belgians. Patronage has selected many of the officers for the front and even found its way into the dry canteen and the soldiers' supplies, but, thank God, this thrust of the mercenary horde who play patriotism with an itching palm and a dry throat is not a fair sample of the patriotic feeling of most New Brunswickers, who, instead of seeking to profit by the stress of the empire are ready to relieve it by giving their nearest and dearest for the work. They are not trying to cringe behind the screen of loyalty and divert the attention of the public from their misdeeds to that of the country's need and so escape punishment. That is the part some New Brunswick Tory politicians are playing today, but we can thank our good fortune that the day of the hypocrite is short, and that no man will be permitted for any length of time to preach to his fellowmen and at the same time to prey upon them and betray the great public interests entrusted to his charge.

"It looks to me as if the Canadians might be at Salisbury till spring or late winter."

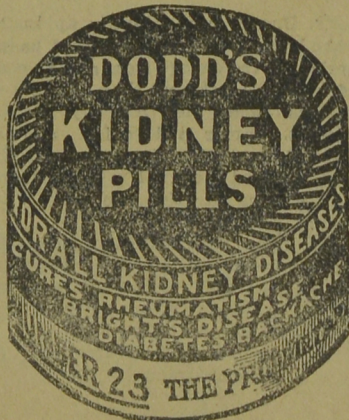
THE MUSICAL MEASURE.
