### SERMON ON THE WAR.

### BAD FIRE AT GIBSON.

A large house owned and occupied by Mr. Havelock VanWart at Gibson was badly damaged by fire on Saturday afternoon. The blaze was caused by an overheated chimney and with a strong wind blowing assumed a most serious aspect. The Gibson fire department quickly responded and after considerable difficulty succeeded in extinguishing the fire. The loss is estimated at about \$600 and is covered by insurance.

### RIVER STEAMERS COLLIDED.

The river steamers May Queen and Elaine collided at Gagetown on Saturday. The steamers arrived in the creek there about the same time and the May Queen made the wharf first. After she had drawn away from the pier and was trying to turn in mid-stream the Elaine went into the wharf. In some manner the stern of the Queen came into contact with the side of the Elaine and several of the windows of the Elaine were smashed. The damage was not serious.

### MILITIA OFFICER DEAD.

Lieut. Col. John Walter de Courcy O'Grady died at Winnipeg last week, aged fifty years. He commanded the 90th Regt., "Little Black Devils," in 1911, and was at Valcartier with the first Canadian contingent. He leaves a wife, six sons and two daughters. Two of his sons, Gerald, Francis and William A., are with the Canadian contingent at Salisbury Plain. Mrs. O'Grady was a daughter of the late Colonel Maunsel, who for a number of years was in command of the Royal Canadian Regiment, stationed in this city. He was for some years engaged in the banking business.

### DIED FROM HEART DISEASE.

Mrs. Howard Grant passed away suddenly at an early hour yesterday morning at her home on King street from heart disease. She was in the thirty-second year of her age and besides her husband is survived by one daughter, Lillian, and three sons, William, Walter and Gerald, all at home. The deceased's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Gieves of Taymouth three sisters, Mrs. Samuel Currie and Mrs. Owen Shortall of Royal Road, and Mrs. James O'Donnell, and three brothers, Angus, Daniel and Clarence Gieves of Houlton, Me., also survive. The funeral will be held on Tuesday afternoon, leaving the house at 2.30 o'clock. Rev. Canon Cowie will conduct the services and interment will be made at the Rural cemetery.

### NEW ORANGE HALL AT NASHWAAKSIS TO BE DEDICATED

Grand Master Wallace, Grand Secretary Morrison and Others to Participate in the Ceremony, which Takes Place Wednesday

The new Orange Hall, which has been erected at Nashwaaksis by Loyal Orange Lodge, Equal Rights, No. 32, will be formally opened and dedicated at two o'clock on Wednesday afternoon.

Orangemen from all sections of New Brunswick will be here for the occasion and among those who will take a prominent part in the opening ceremonies will be Grand Master Dr. W. B. Wallace, K.C., of St. John; Grand Treasurer J. Neil Morrison of St. John, and Grand Lecturer H. T. Brewer of this city. Following the opening a supper will be held in the hall under the auspices of the Nashwaaksis branch of the Women's Institute, the proceeds of which will be donated to the Belgian Relief Fund. The York County Orange Lodge will hold its regular quarterly meeting in the new hall at Nashwaaksis on Wednesday evening.

### STEAMERS CLOSE SEASON.

On account of the sudden change in the weather conditions on Saturday night the steamer Victoria was compelled to return to St. John yesterday morning. The steamer arrived here on Saturday and had intended making her last trip today unless large freights offered. ### MORE VOLUNTEERS ENLISTED FOR OVERSEAS SERVICE

A Detachment of Six Took Their Departure for St. John This Morning---More Will Follow Before End of the Week

Fredericton's second detachment of volunteers for overseas service with the second Canadian expeditionary force, consisting of six men, left this morning for the mobilization headquarters of the New Brunswick Infantry Regiment at St. John, under the command of Corporal Thomas Rutter.

Recruiting is going along steadily at the Armory and Major W. H. Gray, the officer commanding the 71st Regt., and recruiting officer for York, Sunbury and Charlotte counties, expects to send another detachment of volunteers to St. John before the end of the week.

Those who went to St. John this morning were Corporal Thomas Rutter, son of Mr. Harry C. Rutter, chief of the fire department; Mr. John C. Dolan, a former student at the University of New Brunswick; Mr. Peter M. Shaw of this city, Mr. William J. Young of Halifax, and Messrs. George and Alfred Shakespeare of Birmingham, England.

"A" Company of the Fredericton Home Guards, will commence active training for home defence at the Armory, Carleton street, this evening. Sergt. Major H. T. Brewer formerly of the Royal Canadian Regt., will command the company and will be assisted by a competent staff of drill instructors.
