New York, March 20-After a few minutes of dullness the market became active and at end of the first half hour showed fractional gains. Dealings were professional. Copper exports for week ending March 19th, totalled 11,108 tons; since 1st March, 30,438, a year ago 24,621. However, this did not effect the stock of Amalgamated which opened about same as yesterday's close.

C. P. R. opened weak at 206½, over half a point lower than yes-terday's close but regained its loss after a few minutes trading.
