

It only remains for the C. P. R. to step in and offer their prophecies true.

These things which the opposition claimed at that time including connection with the C. P. R., at Westfield, the failure to build the Andover Grand Falls section are all talked of again, and the question is again gravely mooted and discussed, had not the C. P. R. a hand in the whole business from the day it was taken up by Premier Flemming and his government? Did the C. P. R. magnates know what was to happen and has it all transpired as planned?

Many of the members are firmly of the belief that to continue with Gould means a heavy financial drain for some years upon the province with no limit to the bond guarantee that may be demanded. These members are reluctant for the province to go into railroad building, but of the two evils they prefer the latter. They cannot ignore the rumors of heavy payments in connection with the construction already done that did not go to sub-contractors or for anything in connection with construction account. Heavy political payments are spoken of, but the proof is present, though those who are so outspoken as to mention these things declare that when the proof comes the proof will be forthcoming.

These rumors must have reached the ears of the chief executive of the province. He is a man who would not tolerate such a condition of things for an instant, were he given adequate proof. Governor Woods' whole life is a contradiction to any statement to the contrary, and there is not a shadow of a doubt that he will endeavor to keep the record clean. The safety and credit of the province will safely be guarded by him.

President-elect Weyman took the chair and in a brief address thanked the meeting for the honor conferred upon him.

W. G. Clark reported for the Audit Committee.

## RECOMMENDATIONS OF EXTENSION.

Field Secretary Stavert reported for the executive, which was in session in the morning. He stated that after due consideration the executive had decided that it would not be advisable to approach the provincial government at the present session and urge upon its members the necessity for provincial prohibition. Instead it had been thought advisable to ask for amendment to the Liquor License Act. Mr. Stavert recounted the following amendments required which were adopted by the meeting:

To give officers of the law right to seize liquor at railway stations or while in transit on highways, to empower county license inspectors to employ additional counsel when county clerks are unable to act in a case of violation of the Liquor License Act, to make it compulsory, under penalty of imprisonment for a man arrested for drunkenness to tell who supplied him with liquor, to enable persons shipping liquor into a prohibited district to be prosecuted in the district where the offense may be committed, to empower officers to destroy liquor for which no owner can be found, to impose a penalty for shipping liquor under false designation or labels, to impose a penalty for shipping liquor to a fictitious person or address.

The meeting also adopted a recommendation to cooperate to secure the nomination and election of parliamentary representatives in sympathy with the views and aims of the Dominion Temperance Alliance by taking active part in the primary organizations of political parties and to establish branches of the Alliance throughout the various counties of the province.

E. S. Henigar of St. John, a prominent organizing worker of the Sons of Temperance, made a strong protest against the last section of the recommendation on the ground that in the smaller places the province temperance societies existing previous to the organization of the Alliance branches would be interfered with and probably killed by them. He thought that county and city branches were all that were necessary for the Alliance.

Mr. Henigar received some support in his contention but the section finally was adopted with the understanding that the executive could annul it if it were found unconstitutional. It was argued that local conditions often made it advisable that Alliance branches be organized in small places and that the hands of the field secretary should not be tied.

A committee of members residing in Fredericton will present these recommendations to the provincial government.

PRES. FAWCETT'S IDEA.

Pres. Fawcett, in a short address, said that he regretted that the shortness of the time made it impossible for him to make any lengthy remarks upon matters in which he was keenly interested. He thought the Alliance should direct every effort towards securing amendments of the Canada Temperance Act. They could be obtained much more easily than could provincial prohibition. He could not see why druggists should be let off easier than others who violated the act and also thought the number of vendors should be less. St. John was selected as the next meeting-place. The meeting will take place probably in March and it is likely that two days instead of one will be devoted to business.

LATE LEWIS B. PERLEY.

The remains of the late Lewis B. Perley were laid to rest in the Rural cemetery this afternoon. The funeral was under Masonic auspices and was largely attended. Members of Hiram Lodge, A. F. & A. M., No. 6, attended in large numbers and the impressive burial service of the order was read at the grave. Rev. Neil McLauchlan conducted the funeral service.
