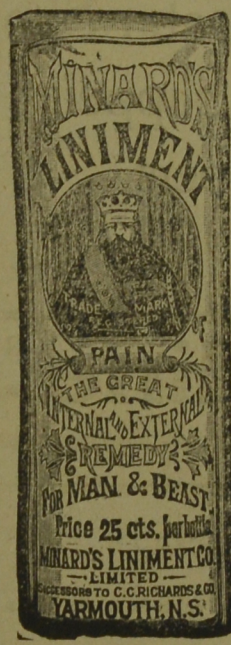

CANADIAN EXPORTS

Goods From Canada Are Sold in South America

Chile imports a considerable quantity of farm implements from Canada. Canadian windmills, one or two industrial machines, a few tools, are also found there, and an occasional shipment of lumber and paper is also imported. To Bolivia, nothing beyond some chairs, brooms and wooden goods seem to be exported.

Peru takes an occasional shipment of lumber. In Ecuador, Canadian flour is finding a market, and bids fair to rival the United States product. If indeed it does not eventually drive it out, or at least form that portion of the trade which buys quality and not the cheap low-grade article which is obtained in California and the Pacific coast of the United States. In Guayaquil, some Canadian tools are also seen. Panama is now purchasing Canadian flour, and also small quantities of silver-plated ware and a patent automobile tire cement.

ORIGIN OF GOLD NUGGETS

Experiments Show That Their Structure Resembles Meteorites

An attempt was made by an investigator in Australia to discover how gold nuggets originate. The first thing done was to cut, slice and polish nuggets with the sole purpose of finding out just what was the nature of their structure.

Close observation revealed the fact that there is some curious points of resemblance between gold nuggets and meteorites. Both when polished and etched with chlorine water, exhibit a crystalline structure. In the case of meteorites the lines thus exhibited on the etched surface are called Widmannstätten figures, and their presence is said to be one of the most invariable characteristics of those metallic bodies that fall from the sky to the earth.

But it is not meant to be implied that gold nuggets have fallen from the sky because they exhibit a crystalline structure recalling that of meteorites. The resemblance is apparently only superficial, and the crystals of the nuggets differ in form from those of the meteorites.

Another curious fact is that when a nugget is heated in a Bunsen flame, explosions take place on its surface. Blisters are formed which continue to swell until they burst with a sharp report and bits of gold are violently scattered about.

It is evident that the nuggets contain either gases or some liquids or solids which are easily converted into the gaseous form, the expansion of which produces the explosions.

HOW B. FRANKLIN SMITH STRIPPED THE RESERVE

he was sent to jail for thirty days, but when they were asked to apply the same penalty to Smith they balked and the next thing in the report shows a letter from the department on the 26th January, to the Indian agent, telling him that the department had decided to sell to Mr. Smith four lots of land of practically one hundred acres each, known as lots 25, 27, 29 and 31, for \$1,765, one fifth down and balance in four annual instalments with five per cent. interest. According to Mr. Bury's report he has taken more than enough lumber off these lots alone, during the present year, to pay for them, and he now has the remaining lumber and land as a gift from the department of Indian affairs, no doubt, for his political services, while the Indian chief languishes in jail and the Indian band are robbed of that which is their inalienable right by the very persons whose wards they are and who by every code of honor should protect, rather than, despoil.

The return then shows that Mr. Smith was able to have appointed a very strong personal and political friend in the person of Mr. Manley Craig, to survey the lots cut by Mr. Smith on that portion of the reserve not sold to him and to do so they were compelled to surmount Mr. Clark, a well known surveyor in the employ of the department up to that date.

It will be interesting to note how much lumber Mr. Craig will be able to find out from that portion of the reserve other than the four lots presented to Mr. Smith. No doubt the last has not been heard of this most remarkable transaction.

ACROSS ATLANTIC IN FIFTY HOURS

Noted Birdman Says It Is Possible in Huge Aeroplane Carrying Two Hundred Passengers

Louis Bleriot, the first airman ever to fly across the English channel, has some interesting things to say about the possibility of trans-Atlantic flight. One of the most interesting is that he thinks it impractical. Bleriot is as great an expert in the mathematics of aviation as he is in the art of actually handling a machine.

"Do you think it is possible to fly across the Atlantic?" he was asked.

"Perhaps, but I would not wish to try it with the aeroplanes we have to-day. Only the very best of luck—miraculous luck—could get a flyer across. An attempt would be full of danger, with many odds in favor of failure and death."

"Why would it be dangerous?"

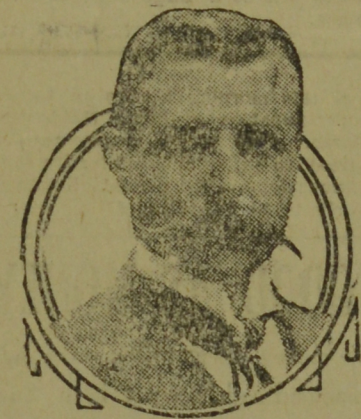
"Because, on the wastes of the Atlantic, the flyer would have to alight beside ships several times to secure fuel, and how could he be sure that he would find the ships. Even if there were a string of ships 200 miles apart—and that is not a long distance for a non-stop flight—how could he find his way from one ship to the next? There is no known way by which an aviator can follow a trail across the Atlantic; his compass might show the his machine headed for the west, but in reality, the moving air might be carrying the flyer southward, without his knowledge, away from the next ship that he is seeking. It would be much the same as being lost in a desert!"

"But would it be possible to build an aeroplane that could carry enough fuel for a non-stop flight across the Atlantic?"

"If I had the money and there was a commercial demand for it I could build an aeroplane within two years that would cross the Atlantic ocean in 50 hours! I have figured it all out and made all my calculations," answered the French flyer. "It would easily carry two hundred persons, a addition to the fuel!"

The great airman drew a pencil from his pocket and made some hurried calculations.

"My plan would be," he said, "to have an aeroplane of 10,000 horsepower. You see," he explained, "we figure that every horsepower carries 22 pounds, so our big trans-Atlantic aere

plane might weigh 220,000 pounds or 110 tons. The engine and the fuel, together with the necessary lubricating oil, would weigh about 35 tons. I could build a very safe aeroplane that would weigh 40 tons, aside from the engine, and this would leave us 40 tons for the passengers. This would mean about 200 passengers unless it was desired to use some of this passenger-tonnage in supplying luxurious surroundings for the passengers."

"How soon, do you suppose, will such aeroplanes carry passengers across the Atlantic?"

"Just as soon as there is a demand for such transportation. It is a problem of commercial demand; not of aeroplane building. But I do not think that aeroplanes will ever take the place of ships, for I doubt their commercial usefulness in crossing oceans. Ships will always be dependent on the weather."

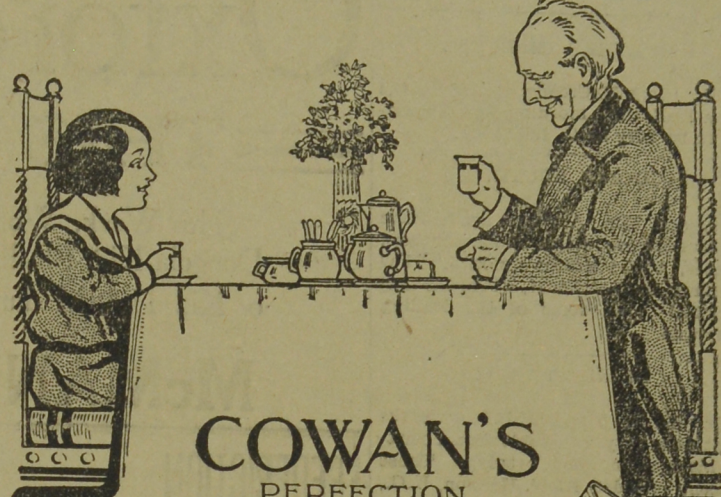
A Valuable Autograph
