ASSISTING WOOL-GROWERS

Sheep-raising Industry to be Further
Improved and Developed

The live stock branch of the Dominion Department of Agriculture is prepared to offer practical assistance to associations of wool growers in the preparation and display of their wool clips for market. Associations, in order to receive aid, must be organized in accordance with the regulations of the branch, and membership is limited to actual owners of sheep. West of Fort William an association must contain at least 2,000 sheep, or sufficient to comprise one cribbed of wool; east of there, a relative number. The services of expert wool classifiers, who will take charge of and perform the grading, classification and preparation of the wool, will be provided.

This proposal represents much more than a mere continuation of the work that has already been undertaken. It means the introduction of a definite scheme whereby wool producers may be actually assisted in preparing and presenting their wools upon the market in the most acceptable fashion, and thus be in a position to cater more directly to the requirements of the market. Moreover, it should prove effective in developing and improving the general status of sheep-raising and in creating an impetus to the production and preparation of an improved grade of wool, and indirectly, a better class of mutton.

ZAM-BUK SAVED MY FINGERS

WHITE LEGHORNS ON FARM

Upon close analysis it will be found that Leghorns are better adapted to artificial conditions of poultry keeping than are most other breeds, says M. A. Jull in Weekly Witness. They are a small, active, breed with a nervous disposition, and they will stand crowding more than will general purpose or meat breeds. Under average conditions they will give better success when artificial conditions of hatching and rearing are employed than with heavier breeds. The chicks are easy to raise. For two years in succession we have raised far more White Leghorn chicks in proportion to the eggs set than can be said of our utility classes of poultry, so that, all things concerned, the White Leghorn will probably stand a little rougher use and more careless treatment than other breeds, although this is not to be considered as a distinct advantage. On the other hand, it is doubtful if the Leghorns will stand our winter weather quite as well as our Plymouth Rocks, Rhode Island Reds, or White Wyandottes. I think they should be given warmer houses, and then they will do practically as well. We have had some White Leghorn cockerels with some Plymouth Rock and Rhode Island Red cockerels in a colony house 36x12 feet, and it dropped to 20 below zero in the house during our cold snap. The Plymouth Rock and Rhode Island Red cockerels had their combs frozen, while the Leghorn cockerels had their combs frozen off almost entirely.

The chief value of the White Leghorn lies in its ability to produce broilers quickly, and more especially to produce a large number of eggs rather cheaply. Leghorn, of course, is not a good table bird except as a broiler, and the broiler business must be considered as a side line in poultry keeping. No attempts should be made to fatten Leghorns for roasting purposes, as such attempt usually results in loss of time and money. The great asset of the White Leghorn is its egg-laying ability, and this is the factor which should be considered chiefly in keeping of White Leghorns on the farm or on commercial poultry plants. Then, above all, more important than breed is the strain, and by all means great care should be taken to select and breed as good a strain of Single Comb White Leghorns as is possible to obtain.

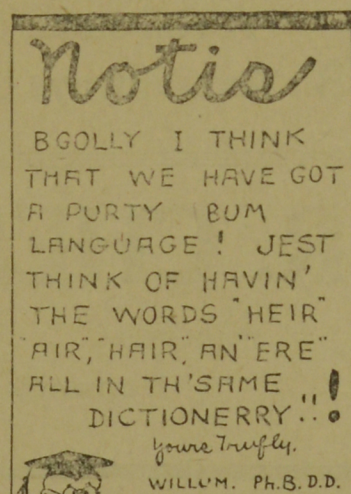

HONEY STATISTICS

Living Conditions Favorable For Bees—Worwers and Food Plentiful

For the purposes of reporting on the condition of bees in Ontario and the honey crop prospects blanks are sent to a large number of beekeepers by the Department of Agriculture. One thousand replies are received, on average, from which reports are summarized.

The total number of colonies reported according to last figures is about 41,318, being an average of 32 colonies, spring count, for each beekeeper reporting. The winter loss is about 7 1/2 per cent. What losses there are during the winter are due principally to starvation caused by lack of sufficient feed in the hives.

So far as the condition of bees is concerned, the prospects for a good honey crop this year are very good, but clover is only in a fair condition, having been very much injured in many localities by unfavorable weather conditions.

SCIENCE AND CONSERVATION

Elimination of Wood Waste Will Give Country Many Thousands of Dollars

It has been estimated that in converting logs into finished lumber and lumber products, the waste amounts to over 50 per cent. of the b.l.s. of all trees cut for lumber. This is equivalent to an annual loss of from \$10 to \$15 for every man, woman, and child in the country. At present it is impracticable from a financial standpoint to reduce this waste as there is no market for the tree tops, stumps and weed-trees left in lumbering operations, and only a very limited one for the bark, slabs, sawdust, edgings and trimmings of milling operations.

The Department of the Interior is recruiting the staff of its Forest Products Laboratories, recently established in connection with the Forestry Branch, with skilled mechanical and chemical engineers and by constant experimentation it is hoped to find a commercial use for these products.

Timber has often been shunned as a structural material because no reliable figures regarding its strength were available, and when complete tests have been made it is regarded as certain that a demand will be created for some of Canada's tree species which are now left in the woods as valueless.

The Forestry Branch of the Department of the Interior, Ottawa, of which these laboratories are one development, has recently issued a circular describing the various lines of investigation to be followed at these laboratories. Not the least important will be to develop chemical methods for utilizing minor wood wastes and another circular written by the engineer in charge of this work deals with the general aspects of the subject. A large percentage of the small-sized waste wood can be utilized by the process known as "destructive distillation," but the machinery employed in this process is not very efficient. The manufacture of ethyl alcohol and producer gas from sawdust has already been proved feasible, and the securing as Superintendent of the Laboratories of John S. Bates, B.A., B.Sc., one of the foremost authorities on wood-pulp manufacture in America, ensures the development of this Branch of Wood Utilization.

Canada Attracts Investors

United States life and fire insurance companies have \$67,000,000 invested in the Dominion, while over \$130,000,000 is invested in British Columbia mills, timber and mines.
