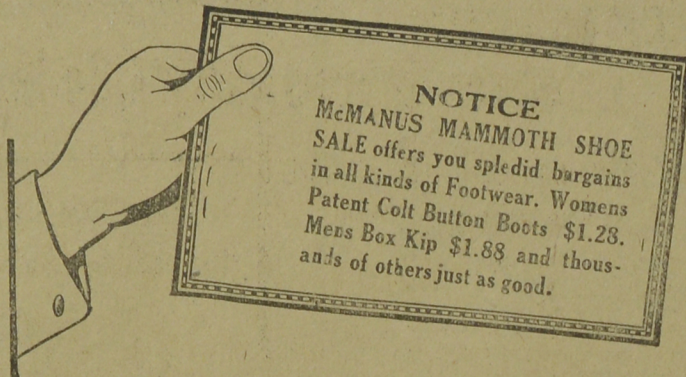
APPLES FOR SOLDIERS.

St. John Times:—About two hundred barrels of New Brunswick apples have been received at the Cold Storage warehouse for shipment to English hospitals as a gift from New Brunswick to the wounded soldiers. The apples are the choicest of the excellent quality of fruit which is this year above the average. These apples will all be picked over and repacked for shipment which will probably be some time next week. It is hoped to have at least 350 barrels. Besides being a very acceptable gift to the sick and wounded soldiers, the quality of New Brunswick apples will become better known to the people of Great Britain.

SHOOTING ACCIDENT HERE ON THANKSGIVING DAY

Young Son of Ex-Ald. Kelly Received Charge of Bird Shot in His Left Hand and Shoulder

The first shooting accident in this vicinity since the opening of the present big game hunting season on Sept. 15, occurred yesterday afternoon on Brick Hill when Harold Kelly, the fourteen year old son of ex-Alderman Cornelius Kelly, was accidentally shot through the left hand and shoulder.

In company with another young boy of about the same age Kelly left yesterday morning to hunt partridge in the O'Dell woods back of the city, and it was while returning home about five o'clock that the accident occurred. As far as can be learned young Kelly was experimenting with a shot gun when it in some way accidentally discharged the charge entering his left hand and shoulder.

The injured boy showed considerable pluck and with the assistance of his chum was able to walk to the home of his parents on Charlotte St. Dr. G. C. VanWart was immediately summoned and he succeeded in extracting the shot from the boy's flesh.

AN INJUNCTION WAS SERVED ON ROSS THOMPSON

Trouble Between Railway Companies Over a Crossing Near Westmoreland Street Becomes Acute—Legal Proceedings Taken

As a result of the St. John and Quebec Railway Company clearing the blockade placed on the C.P.R. track just above the C.P.R. station on York street, and building the crossing for the St. John Valley Railway at that point at an early hour yesterday morning, it is understood that the C.P.R. has served an injunction on Mr. Ross Thompson of the St. John and Quebec Railway Company.

Mr. Thompson went to St. John on the nine o'clock train last evening, and it is said that he is conferring with the C.P.R. officials at that place today with a view to arranging a satisfactory settlement of the dispute between the C.P.R. and the St. John Valley Railway.

A large crew of railway navvies are at work on the new line and at noon today the road was intact for about three-quarters of a mile on either side of the point where the two tracks cross one another.

The clash between the two companies occurred at about one o'clock on Monday morning when a large crew of foreign laborers employed by the St. John and Quebec Railway Company assembled and with some new members who had been recruited to swell their ranks, shoved the car loaded with rails, which had been put in their path, down the track toward the C.P.R. station. The C.P.R. rails were then cut and the Valley Railway's diamond inserted.

Heavy steel rails were piled on the track just above the C.P.R. rail-

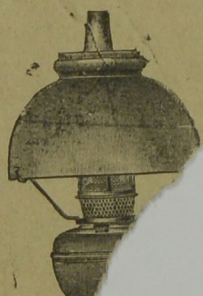

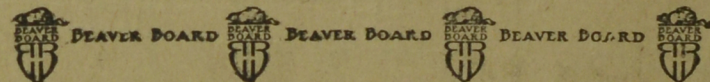
