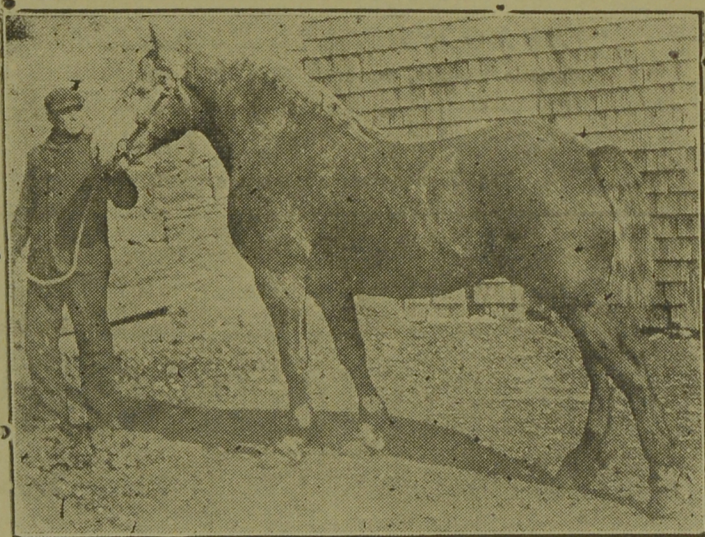

## SHAMROCK IV AGAIN MAKES GOOD SHOWING IN TRIAL

After Being Becalmed She Had Margin of 2-15 Over the Older Shamrock

Southampton, England, June 9.—The first actual racing test between Shamrock IV, Sir Thomas Lipton's new challenger for the America Cup, and his older Shamrock, took place today over a thirty mile course. Shamrock IV finished two minutes and fifteen seconds, elapsed time, ahead of the other, but the difference by no means represents the full measure of the challenger's superiority.

While the wind held true, favoring both yachts equally, Shamrock IV proved much the speedier craft, but nearing the finish, when she had a long lead, the wind almost deserted her, while the older boat, still holding a good breeze, rapidly closed the gap.

The course was from Hythe to Warner Lightship and return.

According to American measurements, Shamrock IV gives the older Shamrock an allowance of four minutes and twenty-three seconds over a thirty mile course.

## K. O. BROWN OF CHICAGO BEATEN BY MIKE GIBBONS

Boston, June 9.—Mike Gibbons, of St. Paul, was awarded the decision over George (Knockout) Brown, of Chicago, after twelve rounds here tonight. Gibbons led throughout the bout, outpointing Brown in every session.

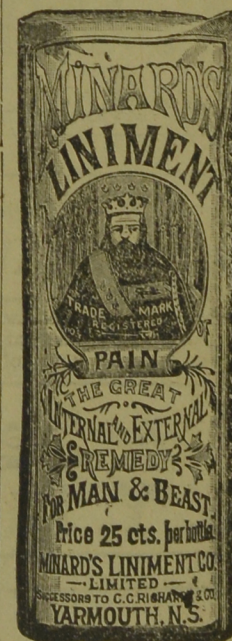
