## DREDGE GETTING READY.

The Dominion government dredge No. 12, built by Messrs. Fleming, is at present at Rowan's wharf, Indian-town, fitting out for the season's work. The dredge performed her first work last summer and since she was laid up at Indian-town has received considerable additional improvements. She is now being fitted with a new adjuster and Messrs. Fleming are at present installing two upright engines for working it. As soon as the additions are completed the dredge will be towed to the Oromocto shoals, where she will work. Being a suction dredge with great power, she is able to suck the material from the bottom of the river and can drive it through large pipes for a distance of 1,600 feet. The dredge is up-to-date in every respect and is a credit to her builders.

## SIR JAMES CARTER'S PORTRAIT UNVEILED IN APPROPRIATE MANNER

Charles G. Carter of Kingsclear Unveiled Portrait--Dr. J. D. Phinney Accepted It--Address by Chief Justice McLeod

The presentation of the portrait of Sir James Carter to the Barristers' Society of New Brunswick and its acceptance by the Supreme Court, with permission to hang it upon the walls of the Supreme Court Chamber, took place yesterday afternoon in the presence of a large number of the representatives of the bar.

The presentation was made in the Supreme Court Chamber by Charles G. Carter of Kingsclear, a grandson of Sir James, on behalf of his father, Col. Carter, now residing in England.

Mr. Carter unveiled the portrait, which is pronounced an excellent likeness by those who remember Sir James. Mr. Carter made appropriate reference to his grandfather.

Dr. J. D. Phinney, K.C., on behalf of the Barristers' Society, accepted the portrait and paid an eloquent tribute to the memory of Sir James, who was the last chief justice appointed by the imperial government. While holding office he impressed all people of New Brunswick with a sense of his ability and fitness. Dr. Phinney asked for permission to hang the portrait upon the walls of the chamber.

Chief Justice McLeod granted such permission, saying that he had a personal recollection of the late Chief Justice in chambers. His retirement after thirty years of service was re-

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## DAMAGE BY FROST IS NOT YET FULLY ESTIMATED

Apple Crop Will be Seriously Affected and Small-Fruits Also--Report That Annapolis Valley Received Severe Touch From Frost

The damage sustained by farmers and fruit-growers in New Brunswick cannot be fully estimated for some time but it is feared that it is very extreme as the blossoms in the apple orchards and many field-crops were sufficiently advanced to receive the full effect of the frost which came in succession with some days interval.

A. G. Turney, provincial horticulturalist stated this morning that he has received some word from apple-growers of this section. Their orchards had been hard-hit but they were hoping for the best and as the season progressed it would be learned what was the extent of the damage. From the lower part of the St. John Valley the report was that the frost was less severe than in other sections and that the orchards had suffered little. Small fruits have suffered also but probably not to the extent that the apple trees have.

Mr. Turney stated also that from a private source of good standing he had received information that in the Annapolis Valley of Nova Scotia the apple-trees particularly the Gravenshams had suffered much from frost.

The field-crops and vegetables grown on farms have been very much set back by frost. Turnips, buckwheat, beans and in some cases clover have all been affected.

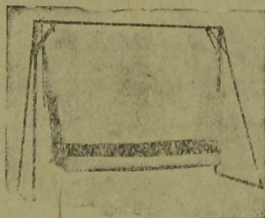
