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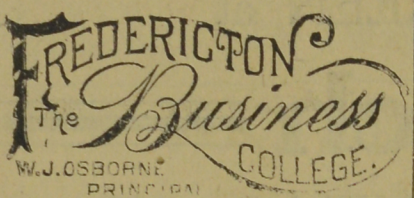
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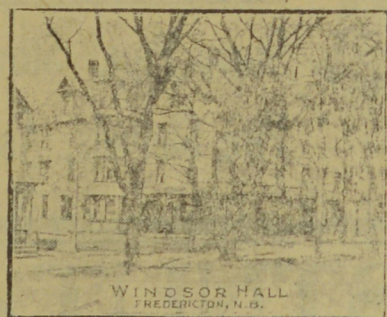

Mr. Moore will return to the Tobique on Friday to meet a party of Americans who plan to spend the rest of November at his camps.

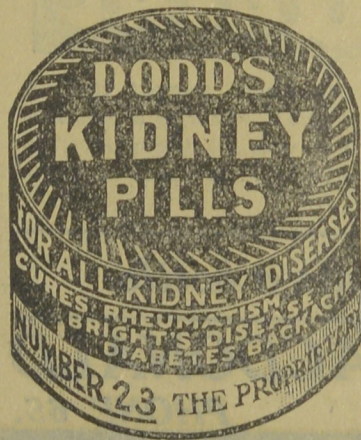
MARYSVILLE TOPICS

WAR NEWS

London, Nov. 4—The Balkan nations and Greece are persistent in their determination that Turkey must arrange directly with them, the terms of peace without the intervention of the European powers. This attitude is emphasized in a statement from official sources, says:

"The Turkish proposal of peace is satisfactory in so far as it shows a desire to prevent further bloodshed. As regards foreign intervention however there seems to be no chance of the Balkan states listening to any foreign course, while treating for the arrangements of conditions of peace. These must be settled between the Balkan states and Turkey."

It may at this stage be declared that the whole campaign was pre-arranged and has so far been carried out exactly in accordance with the program. For a considerable time an officer of the Greek military staff, Col. Dousmani, was engaged at Sofia preparing the military details while the political program was largely if not entirely the work of Premier Venizelos of Greece.

The Union of the Balkan states at this moment is more close, hearty and intimate than it has ever been for it has been welded by blood and common sacrifice. There is not the least danger that any disagreement as to the division of territories of the positions of the frontiers will disturb it.

It may be assumed that inasmuch as the details of the campaign were arranged with the greatest care, the same procedure will be followed both as to the conclusion of hostilities and subsequent consideration.

The anxiety of Austria-Hungary that Serbia shall not occupy Albania and thus secure the outlet to the Adriatic Sea which the Servians are so desirous of, will probably provide a great bone of contention. Serbia has been warned already from Vienna that her armies have gone far enough to the west. This warning is repeated today by the semi-official Fremdenblatt. After praising the Serbian soldiers for their humanity the newspaper says: "The humanity the newspaper says: 'The Servians having approached the frontier of a territory occupied without exception by Albanians, it is hoped and expected now that Serbia will avoid the raising of these difficulties which the historic character of the Albanians will prove insurmountable.' The most elementary justice demands that the principle of the Balkans for the Balkan people shall also be to the advantage of the Albanians."

Prince Chirka the president of the Albanian National Committee is said to be proclaimed king of Albania.

WARSHIPS DEPART

Vsenna, Nov. 5—The first division of the Austro-Hungarian fleet consisting of three battleships, one cruiser and two torpedo boat destroyers left the Raval Station at Pola for the east during last night. The exact destination of the warships is not known but the commander of the fleet has been ordered to report to the Austro-Hungarian ambassador at Constantinople from whom he will find out where the vessels can best be employed.

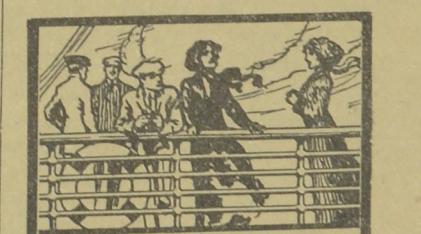
CONTESTED ELECTION
